THE REFERENDUM.

The Attorney General has recently rendered an opinion where- in he holds that an emergency clause, properly drawn and attached to any act passed by the legis- lature renders such act exempt from the referendum amendment to the constitution. This is a conven- ient way to render inoperative the referendum and to thwart the will of the people of Oregon as expressed at the polls by about a 12 to 1 vote. It is an easy matter to at- tach an emergency clause to almost any bill and—if the Attorney Gen- eral's opinion is correct—prevent the people from passing judgement upon the acts of the Oregon legis- lature. Our esteemed contempora- ry, the Dufur Dispatch, in dis- cussing this matter says: "We hope and we believe that the Attorney General is correct, for it is an easy way to get relief from a piece of populist rot that never should have found its way to the statute books of the state." "Populistic rot" is a pretty strong term to apply to a measure that was voted on and adopted by the people of a state which boasts of a Republican majority of almost 20,000 but which adopted the refer- endum by a vote of almost 12 to 1. The Dispatch is casting discredit on its own party. So far as Ore- gon is concerned the initiative and referendum amendment may be classed as a republican measure as it has been warmly endorsed by leading republican papers and politicians as well as by the party conventions and by the voters at the polls by an overwhelming vote and now to have the Dispatch class it as "Populistic rot" is too bad.

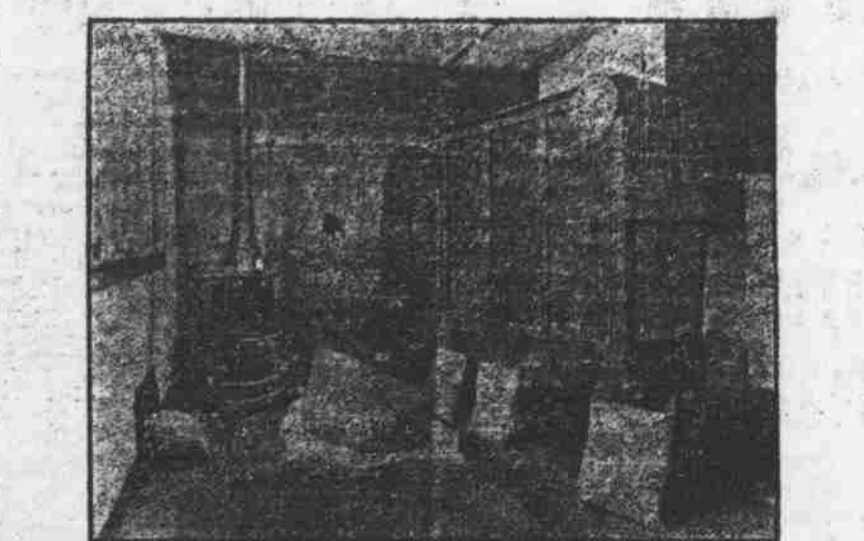
