Railroad Rumors.

Rumors to the effect that J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern, is looking for a route for a line of his road to San Francisco and that a line has already been reconnoitered through Eastern Oregon lends color to the belief which prevails in some quarters that he is behind the proposed Arlington & Pacific road.

A report from San Francisco under the date of March 16 says that Santa Fe enterprisers are at work routing a line through Northern California and Southern and Eastern Oregon, the object being to reach the Columbia River through virgin territory. All such reports are encouraging omens for the early opening of Gilliam county to railroad transportation.

Plans Rejected.

The plans and specifications for the new school house which were prepared by Architect Burgraf, of Albany, proved to be so unsatisfactory that all of the local contractors declined to submit bids and on Tuesday evening the school board met and decided to reject the plans and have new ones prepared. Fault was found with a number of provisions in the specifications. The plans called for a basement to be excavated 4 1/2 feet below the lowest point of the surface and the class of material called for, including lumber, brick and even the sand for plastering would have to be shipped from Portland as the particular class required could not be obtained here.

In calling for new plans we understand the school board will dispense with the basement and also with plaster on the inside of the building. The basement was considered unnecessary and would be very expensive if the required excavation should strike bed rock and an inside finish of good lumber ceiling is considered much better for this country than lath and plaster. Objection was also made to the subdivision of the building, some members of the board claiming that too much room was wasted in hallways etc., leaving the school rooms too small. It is to be hoped this hitch will not interfere with the completion of the building this summer as such a failure would, under the circumstances be little short of a public calamity.

A Square Foot vs a Foot Square

The old bewhiskered problem, "What is the difference between a foot square and a square foot," has been the leading subject of discussion around town for the past week.
