## FAIR AND PORTAGE.

The effort to defeat the Lewis and Clark Fair by the referendum appears to an impartial observer to be ill advised. If, however, a sufficient number desire to invoke the referendum on the Fair proposition there can be no logical objection raised to the matter being submitted to a vote for this is a constitutional right which the people of Oregon enjoy. The principle of the initiative and referendum is all right as every man who believes in real popular government must admit, and while it would no doubt be a matter of deep chagrin and disappointment to all progressive citizens if the Fair appropriation should be defeated, after all of our neighboring states have made handsome appropriations to assist in making the affair worthy of the great event which it is intended to commemorate, the disciples of progress would have to acquiesce bitter though the dose would be. If the referendum is invoked against the Fair it is probable that it will also be applied to the portage road proposition and it will behoove the progressive citizens of the state to stand shoulder to shoulder for both of these propositions. Both stand for progress and advancement in the material welfare of the state and if there is a vote taken the mossbacks must be defeated. The Fair means much for Portland and the whole state. The Portage road means everything to Eastern Oregon and if both measures are submitted to the people it is likely that they will stand or fall together. By all means we must help defeat both.

Assessor Strain, of Umatilla county is "doing things" in the matter of property assessments. He proposes to assess all real estate and personal property at one-third its actual cash value and railroad property looks the same to him as the garden patch of the humblest citizen. The effect of this new departure will be to raise the assessment of the railroad property from \$4,620 per mile to \$14,600 per mile. This is business and the same rule should be applied in every county in Oregon.

Gilliam county should take hold of this matter and furnish the Portland people the information desired. It would be of great value to the county.

## Report of the Coal Strike Commission.

The report of the commission appointed by President Roosevelt last fall was made public last Saturday. Following is a summary of the report:

1. Ten per cent increase in wages paid contract miners and a reduction of hours for other mine workers.
2. A sliding scale whereby the wages of miners may be increased according to the price of coal.
3. A award of extra back pay to miners for work from November 1, 1902, to April 1, 1903, amounting to \$1,000,000. Operators given until June 1, 1903, to make the payment.
4. Eight-hour day for engineers and firemen, nine hours for other mine workers, on basis of former 10-hour day.
5. No discrimination against union or non-union miners.
6. No compulsory recognition of the union but practical recognition by providing that mine workers' organization have full participation in the formation and operation of—
7. A board of conciliation to settle any disputes arising out of the commission's awards.
8. Occupation of coal mining classed as extra hazardous.
9. Boycotts condemned as applied to women and children.
10. Black list utilized by employers condemned.
11. Practice of employing deputies and coal and iron police in interest of operators strongly denounced.
12. Compulsory investigation of labor controversies by state and federal commissions recommended.
13. Losses caused by the anthracite strike total the enormous sum of \$100,000,000.

The report taken as a whole may be reckoned as a victory for the miners as it practically recognizes the union and gives them decided gains in the increase of wages and the reduction of working hours.

President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers is said to be well pleased with the report while President Baer and his associates are reported to be greatly displeased.
