J. G. Stevenson was in from Ferry Canyon Tuesday. He reported a heavy hail storm at his place Monday. Fine hail covered the ground to a depth of two or three inches.

The Arlington Lumber Co. closed a deal with J. Lancaster for a block of ground on North Main street opposite the Condon Milling Co.'s plant on which they will establish a first-class lumber yard.

J. A. Morris has secured the contract to furnish the frames, moldings and other finishing material for the new court house. Mr. Morris will have his mill in operation at an early date and will no doubt find a big business awaiting him for the coming season.

Mr. Grimes, buyer for the Union Meat Co., of Portland, was here the first of the week looking after fat cattle. He bought the Dunn and Fitzwater cattle here and went on to Mayville to look at several lots in that vicinity. He expects to take out about 250 head from this country.

Olex has completed the organization of her crack ball team for the coming season. The city by the picturesque stream is all right in the way of brass bands ball teams and big city limits, but if Condon, Arlington or Mayville are going to be in it on ball they would better get together and "play ball."

Assessor Shelton with two efficient deputies, Miss Pearl Shelton and Otis Campbell, is still busy engaged in getting the affairs in shape in his office before starting out to make the annual assessment. Mr. Shelton takes hold of the work like a veteran and says there is only one way to do the work and that is the right way.

Word reached here from Olex Tuesday that the new bridge across Rock creek was in danger of going out. The strong current was said to be cutting under the abutment and it was feared that the bridge might go out at any time. It was closed to travel and the stage to reach Olex must go via the Crum grade and back down the new grade.

R. W. Cooke has been awarded the contract of moving the old court house and vault from the site of the new building. The old building will be removed to a temporary location on the southeast corner of the block where it will be used by the county officials until the new building is ready for occupancy. Mr. Cooke receives \$100 for the job.

H. W. Corbett Dead.

Ex-senator H. W. Corbett, Portland's most prominent citizen died suddenly of heart failure at his home in that city at 8:45 Tuesday morning. He was 76 years old. Mr. Corbett resigned his position as president of the Lewis and Clark Fair on the day before his death on account of failing health, but his death came unexpectedly and as a shock to the city and state.

Commencement Exercises at Olex.

Last Friday evening, at Wade's hall, Olex, was held the commencement exercises of the eighth grade class of the public school of that place. It was a red letter day for the school and the community generally and especially for the half dozen bright young people who composed the class and who so excellently performed their part in making this first commencement occasion in their school a great success.

Nellie Winsor, reid delivered the salutatory and in a few well chosen words extended a warm welcome to parents, friends and neighbors. She was followed by Jesse W. Cram, who delivered the oration, choosing for his subject, "The Death of Benedict Arnold," which was delivered in an excellent manner. "The Lack of Oregon Literature" was the subject chosen by Alice Randall for a most interesting essay. Miss Randall's effort showed much thought and study of the subject which was well composed and excellently delivered. The Class Poem by Della Randall was a gem and thoroughly enjoyed by class and audience, and the valedictory, by Cassie Hall was all that the farewell address of such an occasion should be.

The Olex Cornet Band furnished good music for the occasion as did also a male quartette of Olex citizens. Rev. F. C. Flowers, of Condon, delivered an entertaining and instructive address to the class and the diplomas were presented by school superintendent W. K. Neal. Several choice selections of vocal and instrumental music were rendered by local talent completing a program which was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.

Professor Nash the efficient principal of the Olex school is to be congratulated on the complete success of the occasion as well as the splendid showing made by his pupils in all of whom he evinces a pride which is at once pardonable and proper.

Olex may well feel proud of her young graduates of 1903.

School House Location.

At a meeting of the electors of Condon school district held Saturday afternoon to decide on a location for the new school house the site offered by Mont Ward in his field being chosen. J. E. A stiff wind storm swept over Condon Monday afternoon which made things lively while it lasted. The big hay barn belonging to F. M. Springton just north of his residence was blown over and demolished and a couple of buggies in the barn were wrecked.
