Circuit Court in Session.

The regular April term of Circuit court convened Monday morning in Armory hall with Judge Bradshaw on the bench. District Attorney Menefee was present looking after the interests of the state in the several criminal cases which appear on the docket and George Dufur, of The Dalles was here as court reporter. George L. Neale, the veteran bailiff, was in his accustomed place and with stentorian voice sent the echoing sound of the gavel as he called court or gave notice from the front door that John Doe et al must forthwith come into court.

The attorneys present were: S. E. Van Vactor, L. W. Darling, J. F. Pinkham and Jay Bowerman, of Condon; H. H. Hendricks and J. A. Collier, of Fossil; J. M. Johns, of Arlington; H. S. Wilson of The Dalles; C. E. Redfield, of Heppner.

The morning session was devoted to reviewing the docket and disposing of minor cases and just before adjournment J. H. Dunkin who was held on a charge of larceny of wheat was arraigned and given until Tuesday morning to plead. The case of Ida F. Dannison vs. Dixon Gaunt in which the plaintiff sought to recover title to a piece of land alleged to have been deeded to defendant by plaintiff while she was yet a minor, was called and a jury was empaneled and the case started. It soon developed however that the action was commenced before the plaintiff had attained her majority and a non suit was granted. Hendricks & Bowerman appeared for the plaintiff and S. E. Van Vactor and H. S. Wilson for the defendant.

The only case tried out by a jury during the term was that of Grider vs Ward in which Wayne Grider brought suit to recover the value of 88 sacks of Blue stem wheat which he claimed F. Ward had purchased from him last fall, for seed, agreeing to pay him Arlington price for the same. Ward contended that his bargain with Grider was to exchange Little club wheat for the Blue stem, hushel for bushel, Ward to pay Grider the difference in value between the two varieties of wheat at the rate of the premium on Bluestem at Arlington at the time Grider sold his crop. The evidence was about as positive on both sides as could well be each party testifying positively that his contention was the contract. The case went to the jury at about 4:30 Tuesday evening and at 6:30 they returned a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$135.64.

The criminal cases, four in number, were all continued until the next term of court.

Court adjourned Wednesday morning and the judge, prosecuting attorney and visiting attorneys all took the stage for Arlington the same morning.
