The semi-annual statement of the financial condition of Sherman county has been published. The statement shows the county to be in good condition there being more than \$35,000 cash on hand over and above the liabilities. This is a good showing for our neighboring county and if Gilliam had started in on a business basis a few years sooner we might be in the same comfortable circumstances as a county as our neighbor on the west.

Railroad Man Here.

C. F. Overbaugh, traveling freight and passenger agent for the O. R. & N. Co., was in town Friday and Saturday in the interests of his company. Mr. Overbaugh was on a tour of the interior having left The Dalles 12 days before and had covered the Des Chutes country as far as Prineville and then back via Antelope and Fossil to Condon. He stated to a representative of this paper that his trip was something of a revelation in the way of revealing the resources of this country and that if he was in the railroad building business he would want no better field for operation than that offered in Gilliam county as there is no doubt but what a road here would be a paying proposition.

Wheeler County Murder.

Jan. J. Jones was shot and instantly killed by John P. Gilick on Wednesday afternoon about two o'clock, at their sheep range on the south fork of the John Day river, in Wheeler county.

The met. have been having trouble over range for their sheep for some time and the shooting probably grew out of this. Jones is reported to have been unarmed. K-habie particulars are not to hand, but it is said there were four witnesses, two of Jones' men and two of Gilick's. The weapon was a rifle, the bullet penetrating the right breast, (tick at once went to Mitchell and I gave himself up, where Sheriff Keeton took Mr. Jones were conveyed to Mitchell Thursday where an inquest was held today by Justice Waterman, the verdict being "premeditated unjustifiable murder."

Mr. Jones was well known throughout the county, being a member of Fossil Masonic lodge and Mitchell K. of P. lodge, and was universally respected. Of Gilick little is known here. He is a married man with no children, his wife being a sister of Newt Carl of Gilliam county, who is well known in Fossil having resided here for some time last year.—Fossil Journal.
