Sudden Death.

S. R. De Neul, of near Alville, died very suddenly yesterday about noon, at the home of his brother-in-law, Samuel Hizen. So far as known deceased had been in his usual health up till noon of the day of his death. He went to the Hizen home to call and shortly after reaching there complained of a pain in the back of his neck and said he would lie down for a while. An hour and a half later Mrs. Hizen went to call him to dinner and found him dead. His brother, R. De Neul came to town and sent out Justice of the Peace J. F. Pickham and Dr. Luna to investigate the cause of death. Deceased was a native of Germany. He had been in Oregon 12 years and was a lawyer by profession having been admitted to the bar at Portland. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made.

LATER—The body is to be brought to town today and an inquest held to determine the cause of death.
