Dan Rinehart has sold the Rinehart restaurant to Elgin Myers who will take possession next Monday morning. Mr. Myers will build an extensive addition to the place making about 20 extra bedrooms besides an office, parlor etc.

George Gibbons Jr., of Mayville, returned from Portland Friday where he went with a shipment of fat hogs. While in the city he visited his son Talie who is attending school at the Catholic college at University Park. He says the school is a very fine one and his son is making excellent progress.

Hon. W. R. Ellis, of Heppner, circuit judge of the sixth district was a passenger on Sunday's stage enroute to Fossil where he went to hold court in Judge Bradshaw's place. Judge Bradshaw was exposed to the smallpox on his way home from Condon and deemed it best to remain at home until all danger from the disease is past.

Jim Rogers and Charlie Crossfield slipped away Sunday and went down to Thirty-mile on a fishing expedition. They returned in the evening laden with trout, glory, sunburn and appetite. Jim plead guilty to 31 fish and as he told his story first Charlie had no trouble in raising him "out of sight." It is strongly suspected however that about 100 out of the 180 trout Charlie claimed to have captured were somewhat "fishy."

From the Goldendale Sentinel we learn that the Goldendale railroad was completed to Centerville seven miles from Goldendale last Saturday. The same authority informs us that a survey has been made from Goldendale to the mouth of Luna Gulch which seems to point to the road tapping the Columbia at some point near Blalock or Quinns. This would answer the purpose of a portage road although somewhat roundabout.

The Wheeler county Grand Jury has found a true bill of murder in the first degree against John P. Glick for the killing of James L. Jones near Spray a couple of weeks ago. The case was continued to the September term of court. True bills were also found against Morley and De Ford on the charge of larceny from a store. The defendants who have been in jail here for several weeks on a charge of perjury were taken to Fossil Tuesday for trial on the larceny charge.

A pupil in a village school who had been requested to write an essay on the human body handed in the following: "The human body consists of the head, thorax, abdomen and legs. The head contains the brains in case there are any. The thorax contains the heart and lungs, also the liver and lights. The abdomen contains the bowels, of which there are five—a, e, i, o, u, and sometimes w and y. W. H. Wilson, of The Dalles went through to Fossil Sunday to attend court. Mr. Wilson declares there is much indignation among the people of The Dalles at the action of Orin Kinerly in needlessly exposing so many of their citizens including his own family to smallpox. It seems that Kinerly was exposed to the disease at Shaniko and was quarantined there but managed to escape from quarantine and continue his trip. It is claimed that he knew when he was at Condon that he was coming down with the disease and without the least regard for the rights of others he exposed scores of people. The people of the entire route over which he travels and sells goods have a just kick coming and if he continues to make this territory he will doubtless hear more about it.
