## The Journal Wagon.

The Oregon Daily Journal has planned one of the most unique advertising schemes ever carried out in the state.

A wagon is to be equipped for traveling—with bows and sheet and cooking outfit complete throughout. A "mess kit" or "grab box" is to be hinged on the rear endgate, just as a stockman's wagon in the roundup.

On either side of the sheet in great black letters, the legend "Oregon Daily Journal Wagon" will appear, followed by the prices of the paper.

A team of light horses will be purchased and the wagon will be furnished with the best grade of camera for taking landscape and stock views, farms, towns, and photographs of animals.

Every minute detail of the preparation has been arranged even to the pewter spoons for the correspondent and the picket ropes for the horses.

This wagon will leave Shaniko in charge of Paul DeLaney as correspondent, and A. E. Peterbaugh as solicitor for the Journal, and will start into the interior of Central Oregon, among the great stock farms and range district, gathering data for special correspondence, write-ups, stories of pioneers, descriptive articles and Indian and frontier sketches.

Many children who are kept out of school because there is a mild case of smallpox at Arlington, 40 miles away, may be seen on the streets, in public places and public meetings without any appearance of being afraid of contagion. There may be more danger at school than around the stage office, brushing up against travelers from everywhere but it hardly looks reasonable that such should be the case.

The Wheeler county grand jury exhibited the best sense by reporting to the court that "we have not examined the books of the county officials for the reason that we are not expert book-keepers and could not make any satisfactory examination of same." That's better than if they had made the stereotyped report "we have examined the county books and find them to be neatly and correctly kept" when as a matter of fact they knew nothing about it.
