Peterson took a crew of men down the canyon Monday to quarry rock for the courthouse foundation. The stone will be secured near Mr. Schaffer's place. Mrs. E. L. Mr. Cordell expects to engage in business in Condon. Mrs. Southwick, organizer for the Woodman Circle is here visiting Wallis Circle and many new applications are expected as a result. The Circle meets this evening in the lodge room of the Armory hall. The sale of horses advertised to take place at J. W. Apple's place five miles from Olex, on Thursday, May 14, has been postponed to Monday May 18. Fifty head of horses will be sold. Remember the new date. Moulding was commenced at Armstrong's brick yard Monday morning. The plant has been very much improved this season and a first-class quality of brick will be turned out. The output will be 8000 a day for the season. Dr. Wood made a trip across to Eight mile Saturday and took the editor of this high toned family journal along to open gates and do the fishing. No bids were submitted for building the new school house and the school board has decided to have the building put up by day work. S. S. Lord, F. T. Hurlbut and J. E. Lancaster at \$27.50 per acre. This deal is very good evidence that the purchasers have unbounded faith in the future of Condon. The land was purchased for townsite purposes and we understand that a 40 acre tract is likely to be platted at an early date. EXPERT'S REPORT

Has Been Filed and is Now Made Public. TOTAL SHORTAGE \$992.68 Half Dozen Ex-Officials Shown to be in Error. William Mackenzie, the expert accountant, who was engaged by the county court several months ago to check up the books of the several county officers of this county has completed the work and submitted his report and the same has been accepted by the County court and is now on file in the Clerk's office. The report is too lengthy to be published in full but below we give the opening statement together with the summary, which gives all that is of interest the rest being merely detailed statements showing the work of the various officers in the different years and the exact time etc. in which the discrepancies occur. Following is the opening statement: Hon. Edward Dunn, County Judge, Dear Sir: I have to report that the work of checking up the books of the County Officers of Gilliam County has been completed and annual reports of such investigation have been rendered to you from the year 1885 to July 7, 1902. The exceptions noted on the annual reports are clerical errors and do not really affect the finances of Gilliam County except as noted herein: The shortage due from the bondsmen of A. Ottman, assessor in 1892, has not yet been fully paid. There is still due \$32.35. In 1894 the following items of interest appear to have been erroneously paid to the Pauly Jail Building and Manufacturing Co., of St. Louis; said to be accrued on warrants after date of call for payment. H. Halstead, Co. treasurer, paid \$130.28 S. B. Barker, " " 121.39 Total \$251.67 From 1885 to 1902 W. L. Wilcox was duly elected sheriff and as such sheriff was the tax collector of the County. The books show tax collections and remittances to the county treasurer by Mr. Wilcox which shows that there is due to the County: From Tax Collections \$208.21 Error in Tax Roll 1892 42.44 Total \$250.65 Mr. Wilcox claims there is due him from School District No. 6 \$132.82, but I can find no evidence of this claim. J. P. Lucas, ex-County Clerk, is in debt to the County \$10.05. From the records in the School Superintendent's office it appears that there is due to Gilliam County from Wheeler County, the sum of \$437.93 for errors in apportioning school funds by E. W. Daggett, ex-School Superintendent. School warrant No. 3, May, 1897, issued for \$55.25 shows in Register [Page 84] \$45.25 error of \$10 against E. W. Daggett. The following suggestions are respectfully recommended: 1 All notices for calling in Warrants should be entered in Commissioner's Journal and copy of notice pasted therein. 2 Treasurer's Books are now kept in store of P. H. Stephenson. They should be kept in vault at court house. 3 All claims authorized by County Court should be entered in Commissioner's Journal and Docket whether acted upon during regular term of Court or during vacation. 4 School Superintendent's Books should be kept at the court house instead of at his home. I have attached hereto the following statements: 1 The tax collections and remittances to the County Treasurer by W. L. Wilcox, sheriff, showing the amounts due the County by years and also the large over payment in 1902 when he was leaving the office. 2 The list of errors in tax roll of 1892. 3 The list of errors in warrants drawn by J.
