CLEAN OUT THE FILTH.

A petition was circulated in town Monday asking the City Council to take immediate action in the matter of cleaning out and thoroughly disinfecting the old reservoir in Main street and also the old sewer, or more properly speaking, the water way, which leads through the town and which is said by persons living near it to be in a deplorable condition, from a sanitary standpoint. The petition was numerous signed and it is to be hoped that the council will give the matter their serious consideration at their next meeting. Public safety demands that these two propositions should be attended to in a thorough manner without delay for as the heated season comes on their condition must become much worse than it is at present if such a thing is possible and the public health is bound to be seriously endangered. Condon is growing at a pace never before known in the town's history and everything indicates that the town is on the eve of an era of prosperity and healthy growth which a few years ago was hardly to be dreamed of. At this time then, above all other times, the town cannot afford to take any unnecessary chances in the way of inviting an epidemic of typhoid or any other disease which finds its inception in accumulations of filth and the urgent duty which at this time devolves on the city council is to take effective action to ward off any such evil. This paper does not wish to pose as an evil prophet or to hold its town up to any undue criticism but it believes that it owes a duty to the public in calling attention to this matter and in urging that immediate steps be taken by the proper authorities to undo any unwholesome conditions which may exist and to put the town in a proper sanitary condition. The old reservoir has received a large amount of filthy drainage from the street for years and it should be cleaned out, or better still, filled up, and the water way, while never intended for a sewer, in the proper sense of the word, has become the receptacle of much garbage and other filth which has long been a stench in the nostrils of many citizens who live along its line. Condon needs a properly constructed sewer at this time but as this improvement can not be hoped for this summer the conditions should be made as bearable as possible until such time as it can be made. This paper has heard vague threats lately of damage suits against the city on account of the filthy condition of the old water way and it therefore sounds this note of warning to the city fathers that they may be on their guard. Money expended in improving the sanitary condition of the town would be well spent; but money expended in defending damage suits would be the same as thrown away. Something should be done and that quickly.

Flood and Flame.

Topeka, Kansas, was visited by a dual calamity the other day when flood and fire united their terrors against the populace. When the town was flooded by the overflowing waters of the Kansas and Kaw rivers and the people were imprisoned in the upper stories of their houses fire broke out and burned scores of buildings to the water's edge. The current in the streets was so swift that boats could not reach the imprisoned people and they were left at the mercy of the flame and flood. More than 200 lives were lost.
