TEN DOLLARS A LETTER.
High Rate on Private Postal Route from Cook's Inlet to Nome.
"Through snow and ice, 1,800 miles is the trip of an Alaskan mail carrier."
W. V. Sullivan, son of Former Senator Sullivan, of Mississippi, made this statement, according to the St. Louis Republic. Mr. Sullivan had just returned from a two years' cruise in Alaska waters on board the United States revenue cutter Rush.

"This trip," he continued, "is from Cook's Inlet to Nome, and by the route traveled is 1,800 miles.
"The last boat leaves Nome about Nov. 5 and it carries down a mighty precious cargo—gold dust, discouraged miners, escaping wives, the scoundrels who come up in the spring, marry the successful prospectors and then desert when the winter shuts up the town from the rest of the world and the last mail sack Uncle Sam brings through the Aleutian Islands for six months.

"Then, while you people down here in the big cities are squabbling for 1-cent local postage the men up in Nome are getting ready to pay the heaviest postal rate in the world. By Dec. 25 they've got the Christmas hunger for home news and New Year's day they'd give a side of bacon for a sight of familiar handwriting on an envelope. Bacon is still about 50 cents a slice in the eating houses.
"Just about Jan. 1 the midwinter Alaskan mail starts north from Seattle. It is carried up by the owner and operator of the enterprise, who runs a private mail service not recognized or promoted by the United States government. He collects letters from Seattle to Cook's Inlet, making the trip on a vessel that is scheduled to stop at Sitka, Douglas Island, Juneau and all the points of any importance along the coast.
"Only letters are carried and these must be written on onion skin paper, for bulk is the chief consideration, and, besides the rate is so much a pennyweight.

"When Cook's Inlet is reached the letters are packed in tin boxes made to conform to the carrier's body and fit into the lining of his coat. The carrier's costume, from the fur cap to the Mouskaki boots, is exactly like that of the Eskimoes, and the principal items in this outfit are matches, gun and ammunition.
"From Cook's Inlet to Nome the trail runs 1,800 miles and touches no man's hut or dugout. The carrier can make forty miles a day on snowshoes. He has studied the country so thoroughly that he knows when he shoots a bird and cooks it for dinner Tuesday, over a fire of scrubby brush, where, fifty miles ahead, he can find more game and fuel for the cooking of Wednesday's supper. After supper he crawls into a cozy snowbank for a snooze through the darkest hours of the long night.
"The greatest obstacle are the torrents that flow too rapidly to freeze. The crossings are made at the narrowest places and the carrier strips, makes a bundle of his clothes, throws it across or carries it on his head, and wading and swimming, he reaches the opposite shore and scrambles into his furs.

"In his thin pockets he carries a fortune, for the thinnest letter taken on the route costs the sender \$10. Usually but one trip is made each winter, but last season he broke the record by making two rounds, doing this by using dogs and a sled part way. His winter's work netted him over \$2,000, to be blown in on the gales of Nome and Seattle."

Vulcanized Timber.
A considerable amount of interest, says Scientific American, has been aroused by the announcement, as the result of a prolonged series of experiments, of a method of treating timber so as to secure even from soft wood a largely increased toughness and hardness. The process is described as one of vulcanizing, comparable in some respects with Bessemer's process of converting iron into steel, and is the invention of Mr. Powell, a Liverpool merchant. The treatment to which the timber is subjected is, roughly speaking, that of saturation at boiling point with a solution of sugar, the water being afterward evaporated at a high temperature. The result is to leave the pores and interstices of the wood filled with solid matter, and the timber vulcanized, preserved and seasoned. The nature of moderately soft wood, it is claimed, is in this way changed to a tough and hard substance, without brittleness, and also without any tendency to split or crack. It is also rendered remarkably impervious to water. Hard wood similarly treated derives similar benefits. Moreover, it is claimed that the process may be completed and timber turned out ready for use in a few days.

"DIXIE" CHEERED EVERYWHERE.
North No Less Enthusiastic Than the South on Hearing It.

"A singular thing about the tune of 'Dixie,' said a Washington man who does a good deal of traveling, 'is that it arouses quite as much enthusiasm when it is played above Mason and Dixon's line—far above that line, in many instances—as it does when it is played down South. I have often noticed this and wondered over it. In the Southern towns and cities, or even in Washington, where Southern sentiment predominates, it is the natural thing for the cheers and the hand-clapping to begin when, for example, a theater orchestra or musical performers on a stage strike up the tune of 'Dixie,' but precisely the same thing happens in the Northern cities. An orchestra never gets into the swing of 'Dixie' in a New York theater that the audience doesn't almost come to its feet. They cheer 'Dixie' vociferously every time it is played in San Francisco. They yell in approval of it in Detroit, and St. Paul, and Cincinnati, and in Chicago they hum it along with the band or orchestra. Even in chilly Boston they wake up and give a hand to 'Dixie.' It's a lively and inspiring tune, of course, but I don't think that fact exactly explains why it is that it arouses enthusiasm in communities in the North, where a Southerner would scarcely even expect to hear it played, much less cheered. Maybe it's because there's a lingering love all over the country for the old South, and maybe it is because there's a pretty general and wholesome sentiment all over the land for the section that came out of the big fight a good deal like the under dog; but at any rate, 'Dixie' the tune that gets the biggest hand and the wildest acclaim, no matter where it's played, from Michigan to the Gulf, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific."—Washington Post.
