A COMPENSATION.

The recent disaster at Heppner, while one of the most terrible calamities which has ever befallen any city, population considered, is not without its compensation. It is worth something to have the better qualities of humanity brought out once in awhile lest we grow to believe that the noble impulses of the human heart have become entirely obliterated in this sordid selfish age, when, to the casual observer, it often seems that the whole structure of human endeavor and effort is founded on purely selfish motives. The people of Oregon have scarcely realized the true import of the published stories of similar horrors which have occurred from time to time, in different parts of the world, during the past few months, but it was only necessary that such a calamity should be brought home to them that the entire state should be swept with a wave of brotherly love and Christian charity such as has not before been felt in the Oregon country, at least since the early pioneer days. When the news was flashed abroad Monday morning that Heppner had been devastated, her many beautiful homes ruined and hundreds of her people killed, there swept with it a wave of fellow feeling and love which was good to see. Every community at once began to devise means of relief. Hundreds of men and scores of women were on the road to Heppner in an hour to do what they could to care for the living and to bring some sort of order from the chaos the flood had wrought. Rich and poor, high and low, the banker and bootblack, the cultured lady and the outcast from the red light district, worked side by side in this labor of love and all were actuated by a common impulse. Death, the great leveler, was there and in his awful presence rank and station, personal comfort, everything was forgotten in the common desire to aid and comfort their stricken neighbors. Were it not for such occasions as this to bring out our better qualities we might come to think that real love and tender hearts and kindness one to another had perished from the earth.

The property loss due to Heppner flood foots up a grand total of \$550,000 divided as follows: Individual losses, \$350,000; city of Heppner, streets and bridge, \$50,000; Willow Creek valley, farms, crops, fencing, stock, etc., \$150,000.

We learn from the Blue Mountain Eagle that W. A. Campbell, the well known insurance man who has hosts of friends in Condon and Gilliam county, as well as all over the interior of Eastern Oregon, is down with typhoid fever at Canyon City.

The Condon Brickyard presents a busy scene these days. A full force of men is employed and 8000 brick are made every day. The first kiln of 250,000 will be ready to fire in about a week and from 75 to 85 cords of wood will be required to complete the burning.

Hawes & Price are pounding away with their steam well drill at the new city well near the water tower. They have encountered two or three strata of unusually hard rock but are making satisfactory progress. The well is now down about 110 feet with 65 feet of water. More water is being encountered with depth and the indications are favorable for a strong well.

Condon There First.

The Dalles, through the Portland Journal claims to have been the first town in Oregon to reach Heppner the day after the flood. Condon disputes this distinction with the town on the Columbia and lays claim to being the first town outside of Willow Creek valley to reach the stricken city with a relief corps. News of the flood reached here about 8:30 a. m. and within an hour relief parties were on the way. More than 50 Condon people reached Heppner before dark Monday over the longest and hardest 40 mile stretch of road in this part of Oregon and were ready for work at 4 o'clock the next morning. Condon has no desire to detract from the good work done by any other town but it declines to yield the palm to The Dalles in being first on the scene of desolation and ruin.

POPULAR NORTH BEACH.

Excursion Steamer T. J. Potter goes into service June 27.
