Jay Barr, who now has charge of the city pumping plant, has the new engine installed at the lower well or well No. 3, and the old engine at well No. 1. Both engines have been set on firm concrete foundations and are working nicely. No trouble is experienced in keeping up the supply of water since the new engine has been installed and the too lavish use of water by some irrigators has been checked.

Situation at Heppner.

The work of rearing bodies at Heppner and clearing the town of wreckage has been vigorously prosecuted since the awful flood of 10 days ago and as good progress is being made as could be expected. Hundreds of volunteer workers from all over Eastern Oregon were there all of last week working early and late to recover and bury the dead and to bring some kind of order out of the awful conditions which existed as a result of the most terrible flood ever known in the northwest.

The volunteer workers were worn out by Saturday night and obliged to go home and from now on the city will have to depend on paid men to carry on the work of relief.

One of the most serious phases of the situation was the large amount of filth which had been left everywhere by the receding waters and radical means were necessary to ward off another horror from the stricken town in the shape of an epidemic of typhoid or other deadly disease. Dr. Smith, of Pendleton, a member of the State Board of Health is superintending the work of cleaning up the town. He considers the situation very grave. Flooded cellars, cess pools etc are pumped out, streets are scraped and flooded with clear water and the town is being thoroughly disinfected. For this purpose alkali soil is being hauled in from the surrounding hills and the whole town is being treated to a coat of this natural disinfectant which Dr. Smith declares is first-class. It was impracticable to try to save any lumber or other material from the drift and everything is being burned as rapidly as possible.

Relief is coming in from all quarters of the states well as from many eastern cities. Condon sent a donation of over \$500 in cash Sunday and besides this over 100 of her citizens were there during the week to assist with the relief work.

Saturday morning a committee of citizens composed of County Judge Dunn, School Superintendent Neal and Postmaster Keisacher circulated subscription papers for the purpose of creating a fund for the relief of the flood sufferers at Heppner. The citizens responded very liberally and in a short time over \$500 was raised. Judge Dunn took charge of the fund and on Sunday morning sent a check for the amount to Judge Bartholomew with instructions to him to turn it over to the proper committees. It having been reported here that there was much suffering at Lexington the request was also made that a portion of the Condon subscription should be used to relieve the needy there if the conditions there are as reported here.
