The local Odd Fellows lodge at its last meeting voted \$25 to the Heppner flood sufferers. The K. of P. lodge voted \$40. These amounts bring the total of Condon's donation to her unfortunate neighbors up to nearly \$600.
It is reported that range trouble has again broken out in the Murderer's Creek country in Grant county. A band of sheep belonging to James La Bro was shot into and 25 head killed, the camp was burned and the herder's horses driven off.
Mrs. W. R. Neal and daughters left Sunday morning for Monmouth where they will remain for a year or so while the daughters are completing the course at the State Normal school. Condon loses a most estimable family and many friends will regret their departure. Prof. Neal accompanied his family as far as The Dalles and from there went on a visit to his old home in Washington.
A recent arrival in Condon says that he has been in many western towns of late years but that he has never seen another place of the size of Condon with as much life and business bustle as this town has. It is a fact that Main street presents as busy a scene every day and evening as might be expected in the center of a town of ten times the size. If anybody asks you just tell them that Condon is on the boom.
A traveling peddler with a wagon load of goods wended his way into town Monday morning and called at the clerk's office to secure a license to hawk his wares which is required under the new law passed last winter. When Deputy Clerk Carter said "\$50 per quarter" the "yeshish gentlemen" nearly fainted. Carter had to fan him for ten minutes before he was able to move on to more promising fields. This is a good law and should be rigidly enforced in the case of all non-resident peddlers with special attention to Iowa buggies and Home Comfort steel Ranges.

A New Industry.

An important new industry for Condon has just been completed and is now ready for operation in the south end of town. This is J. A. Morris' planing mill and frame and moulding factory and to say that it is a most complete and up-to-date plant is but to express the truth. Mr. Morris has invested a considerable sum of money in the plant and should be rewarded by a liberal patronage.
His plant consists of a two story frame building 24x30 feet. The power is furnished by a 10-horse power boiler which supplies steam for an 8-horse power vertical engine. These operate a combination planer and moulding machine, rip saw, cutoff saw, grooving saw, scroll saw, 32-inch band saw and a 12-foot turning lathe. With this outfit it is possible to turn out all kinds of work for which there is a demand here and the plant will no doubt fill a long felt in this section.
Mr. Morris feels that there is a large demand here for the product of such a mill as his and knowing that he can do equally as good work at low or lower prices than the same stock can be shipped from Portland he believes that he is safe in expecting a liberal patronage. He will use only the best quality of lumber from the Lost Valley mills and can insure his patrons satisfaction in every respect. Mr. Morris will be pleased to have people from the surrounding country and neighboring towns call and see his plant when in the city. He will be pleased to show you around and if you should favor him with an order at any time he will no his best to please you.

Some Quiet Towns.

Fred Cornett, of this place and George Knox, of Fossil, have returned from Sherman county where they took fifty head of the Chapman band of horses, belonging to Mr. Knox and W. L. Barker, for sale. They expected to sell the entire band at public auction at Grass Valley Saturday but after selling a few head they called the auction off and closed out the bunch at private sale. Prices ruled very low, below what could have been realized here at home. Mr. Cornett says he visited Wasco, Moro, and Grass Valley the three principal towns in Sherman county, during his trip and as compared to Condon they are all everlastingly quiet. "Why," says Mr. Cornett, in speaking of his trip Monday, "those Sherman county towns are as dead and quiet as country church yards. You may hardly believe it but, really, Grass Valley, the liveliest town in Sherman county, is quieter than Fossil. Such a thing does not seem possible but it's a fact. The crops around Grass Valley and Moro look well," Mr. Cornett says, "but from Moro north the grain is very light. I am glad to be at home again in a town where things are doing and people are alive," he concluded.

Sunday's Game.

The score stood 9 to 31 in favor of the Condon but if it had not been that Jim Burns hurt his finger, shortly stubbed his toe, Koster fell down, Britt White was out of practice batting and could not find Jarvis' straight 7 balls and several of the Scrubs got disgusted and quit when Britt got fanned it might have been different. A good sized crowd turned out to see the fun and the weather was fine for a game.
Races For the Fourth.
Lovers of horse racing should be able to find plenty of sport to their liking in Condon on the Fourth as there will be plenty of good horses here and the races promise to be full of interest.
Charlie Earhart is here from Lone with two horses, and Frank Griffith, of Heppner, is also here with a couple of good ones. The old reliable Condon mare, Daisy Downer, owned by Al Downer, is on the turf again and is being trained for the occasion by Jim Cordell who is also training one for Dave Burnett, of Thirty-mile. In addition to these animals which are on the ground at this writing, Jack Gibson is expected here from John Day with a horse and another is expected from Moro. Keeney, of Long Creek, is also expected with a couple and Billy Hamilton, of Hamilton, will be here with a speeder. George Madden of Lone Rock, is also expected to bring one over which will make an even dozen of horses on which the boys may bet their money. The racing may be expected to be a first-class feature of the occasion as the new race track is being rapidly rushed to completion and will be in good condition for a new track.
Flood at Wagner.
Mrs. Ira Hartzell, of Fossil, had a thrilling experience in the storms of last week. She had just arrived at her mother's home at Wagner on Sunday evening when the storm broke, and it was only by a desperate effort that they succeeded in reaching high ground immediately above the house. In a moment three feet of water swept through the house and in Kahler Creek on the bank of which the house stands the water was 20 feet deep. On Monday evening another storm came on which was even worse than the first, the water rising eight inches higher. Mr. Hartzell brought his wife home on the 18th, when she was still suffering from nervous excitement resulting from the fright she had received. The storms did much damage to the hay crops and gardens of Fred Hale, Frank Tompkins, Grant Bros. and others in the Spray section. Several feet of gravel was left by the flood on a very fine garden owned by the Grant boys, permanently ruining it.—Fossil Journal.
