The only classes of people that know everything are the college graduates and the editors of weekly papers—Astorian. If we are to judge by their writings, so far as the editors of some of the daily papers are concerned, this statement is no doubt correct.

Many leading lawyers who have given careful attention to the recent decision annulling the initiative and referendum amendment to the state constitution have expressed the opinion that the decision is unsound and that it will not be upheld by the supreme court.

In the death of Pope Leo XIII, which at this writing is hourly expected, the world loses one of its greatest and best churchmen. Not only Catholics, but people of all creeds throughout the civilized world will mourn his death because of his many noble qualities, his beautiful character and his pure, simple life.

Since the introduction of Negro burning, as a pastime, in the North there is much talk of a race war. These Northern colored persons remember how the abolition fathers of the present day mobs used to pet and make fools of the blacks and now they refuse to "stand for it" when a roasting bee is proposed. All of which goes to show how public sentiment changes on great questions.

In his address here Saturday Hon. N. J. Sinnott proved that it is still possible to make an interesting and instructive as well as an appropriate Fourth of July oration. He steered clear of the bombastic, spread eagle, hip and hurrah, style of the old time Independence Day orator and also avoided imposing a political talk on his audience on an occasion which should be kept free from politics and partisanship. His remarks rang with the true spirit of Americanism and the most favorable comment has been heard regarding the address.

"What a boy knows" is thus summed up by an exchange of the editor of which was evidently once a boy himself: "At 10 years of age a boy thinks his father knows a great deal; at 15 he knows as much as his father; at 20 he knows twice as much; at 30 he is willing to take advice; at 40 he thinks his father knows something, after all; at 50 he begins to seek advice, and at 60, after he is dead he thinks him the smartest man that ever lived." These estimates are probably given for the encouragement or consolation of parents who are struggling to make obstreperous boys of the know-all age "see things," but the awakening of the boys is postponed to a date so late that the most patient father and long-suffering mother can only sigh in contemplating it.

The action of Justice of the Peace Neale in dismissing the Parks-Hardie trespass case Tuesday and taxing the costs up to the prosecuting witness is to be commended. There are too many of these petty neighborhood squabbles allowed to creep into the courts to be threshed out at public expense and the magistrate who has sufficient backbone to sit down on such proceedings is, in a small way, a public benefactor. There is perhaps in a general way, right and wrong on both sides of these neighborhood differences but it looks like an imposition on the public to drag them into court at public expense as has been done too often in this county in the past. Public prosecutors, also should be careful about starting proceedings in every petty case that comes up lest they lend themselves unwittingly to a "get even" proposition at public expense.

Double Tragedy at Mitchell.

Two men were killed and one wounded in a shooting affray at Mitchell on Saturday. A celebration was in progress and during the afternoon Pug Proett, a local bad man, began shooting up the town on his own account. The marshal interfered but was unable to persuade Proett to desist when Milt De Haven, a sheep shearer, volunteered to assist the marshal. De Haven was armed with a Winchester and Proett with a six shooter. Both men began shooting at about the same time and both did deadly work. Proett was shot between the eyes dying in three minutes and De Haven received a ball in the left breast which resulted fatally in about 45 minutes. As Proett fell he pulled his gun off again the stray ball striking the marshal in the leg breaking the bone.

It was a thorough piece of work and left no opportunity for arrests or trials. Barring the accident to the marshal a double funeral was all that was necessary to close the incident.

Serious Charge Against Nettie Hughes.

Sheriff P. L. Keeton has arrested and brought to town Nettie Hughes, from Cosand's place at Trail Fork, Gilliam county. She is charged by Deputy District Attorney, John A. Collier, with concealing the death of her infant child.

The crime is alleged to have been committed on June 5, 1903, at Bert Crawford's place in Wheeler county, about seven miles east of Fossil.

On June 6, a coroner's inquest was held at Crawford's place by acting coroner J. D. McFarland J. P., of Fossil, the jury being as follows: Bert Crawford, E. Baker Smith, David Gibson, A. Cowdy and Mason Myers. The verdict was that the child died through gross carelessness of the mother.

The evidence went to show that about seven o'clock in the evening, immediately prior to the birth, the mother stepped out into the woods outside the house and there gave birth to a male child. In a few minutes she returned to the house, and Mrs. Crawford, suspecting from her appearance that something was wrong, made her lie down and then went out on her plainly marked trail through the brush. There she saw where the girl had apparently been accouched and thence had carried the infant some distance and hidden it in an out-of-the-way place. The babe was dead, although plump, well formed and fully developed. Dr. Coreyell was of the opinion that it had probably been born alive.

The affair has been kept quiet, at the request of the authorities, who wanted to be sure of their ground before making an arrest, which, as above stated, has now been made.

The defendant was raised in the timbered foot hills of the Blue mountains, away from school privileges and almost entirely shut out from human society and is very illiterate. She is commonly reputed to be simple-minded and there is little doubt that the one responsible for her and condition is more to be blamed than she.

Defendant appeared Friday forenoon before Justice McFarland, who placed her under \$250 bonds.—Fossil Journal.
