

EDUCATION AND LABOR.

Following capital and labor educational institutions are going into great organizations.

Rush Medical College, Chicago is to be made a side show of the great Rockefeller University.

Columbia College, New York, will eventually absorb all the institutions above the public schools.

The movement in Oregon is to connect up all the normal schools and smaller colleges with the public schools.

It is likely that some day all the higher institutions of learning at Salem and other principal cities in Oregon will have one management.

Organized capital, organized labor, and organized education will be the ruling triumvirate of civilization.

The relation of education to labor is a subject that should engage the unoccupied gray matter of the community.

What is taught in the schools and colleges respecting labor? Is labor held up as respectable or is it respectable not to labor?

The term "Manual Labor" is heard with increasing rapidity in our schools for defective children. No one would attempt to conduct a state prison or reformatory without the corrective called labor.

President Harris, of the National Educational Association said on July 8: "Work itself is the best moral power."

Education that results in making a man or woman want to live without labor—or live by the labor of others—results in slave holding.

If some of us are to live without labor, others must live in slavery to labor to support the non-laborers.

Education that merely sharpens the intellect to enable the owner of such keen-edged brain to live by his wits is wrong in principle.

All should labor, all should respect labor, all should be taught to labor. "Everyone must work out his own salvation."

If all labored there would be still be moral problems but they would not be accentuated by the illusion that there can and must be little rich.

Even labor organizers have been known to propagate the falsehood that labor is a curse put on humanity because of the sins of Adam and Eve in Eden.

There is no deeper human and moral problem than the relation of education to labor, or one less thought about.

As labor is a moral and ethical necessity to all mankind, education should be made to meet the needs of humanity that labors.

Labor is secondary to nothing. Education is secondary to labor and should prepare the way for labor. Let educators think of this.—Salem Journal.

INFLUENTIAL IMMIGRATION AGENT.

President Roosevelt has been talking so much about his Western trip, and the wonders it disclosed to him, that many people of prominence who would not otherwise have done so are contemplating a tour of the real great West, including the Pacific Coast. Such tours, it is reported, are contemplated by Signor Des Planches, the Italian Ambassador; Baron von Sternburg the German Ambassador; M. Jusserand, the French Ambassador; Song Ojeda, the Spanish Minister; Liang Chen-tung, the Chinese Minister, and others of high rank and repute. So the President's trip may be of substantial benefit to the Far West, for the tours of such men as these will be followed by those of many less distinguished but influential people.

The President already knows more about the West than most Western men do themselves, but his tour was a constant revelation to him, and he could not restrain his enthusiasm about the West on his return to Washington; and when he speaks multitudes listen and are more or less influenced; so that his trip and subsequent talk is likely to result in a very large increase in the westward tourist travel. And the people thus enlightened about or interested in the West will not all be mere tourists either; many of them will be homeseekers and will become settlers. The President's tour was an accident that will be beneficial to the West, in judging this portion of it.—Telegraph.
