He is considerably improved but is not well yet and as his trouble is of a pulmonary nature it is likely he will be obliged to seek a less rigorous climate for a home before a complete cure can be effected. He will probably go to Arizona this Fall and spend the Winter there.

Charlie Jayne came in from the mountains Tuesday on business. He and his brother are ranging their band on the divide between the Malheur and Burnt river and Charlie says the grass is getting pretty short in that region. There has been but little range trouble so far this season. A few sheep have been poisoned and one band was shot into on the head of Burnt river. The Jaynes have bought hay and will winter their band on the Malheur about eight miles from Vale.

Bueche and Thornton, two of Condon's crack sheep shearers, returned Sunday from Montana having wound up the season's shearing in that state on the 22nd. last. They started in shearing at Nampa, Idaho, early in March and would have had a fine season's work only for the big May blizzard in Montana which caused them to lose much time. The loss of stock was enormous the percentage of lambs raised being about 10. The mercury registered below zero. The boys say that Montana, generally speaking is a fine stock country. May blizzards not being common, but they both plead guilty to being glad to be back in grand old Gilliam county.

## May be Tried at Condon.

Wong Hong Quong, the Heppner Chinaman who murdered and robbed a fellow chink named Wong Ching, at Heppner Junction, in this county, on July 11, was arrested at Monument last Saturday by Sheriff Shutt, of Morrow county. The murderer was found hid away in the attic of a Chinese wash house and while the sheriff was getting his prisoner down through the narrow manhole a fire broke out in an adjoining shack which added much to the excitement and interest of the occasion.

When handcuffed the celestial broke down and made a full confession of his cold blooded crime. He said that while sleeping with Gong Lane, a Chinese restaurant keeper of Heppner, Lane planned the murder, even getting a bottle of whiskey to brace up Quong's nerves. Lane then told Quong to go to the Junction and do the job, get the money and come back and divide the spoils with him. After reaching Heppner Junction Quong asked Ching to go out under the shade of some willows to have a talk and after reaching a secluded spot Quong hit Ching on the head with a rock, took \$735 from him and threw his body into Willow creek. He then went back to Heppner and gave Lane \$225 of the money. When captured Quong had \$510 on his person. Lane also skipped out but has since been captured at Portland.

Although the crime was committed in this county the fact that the deed was planned in Morrow county may give the courts of that district jurisdiction of the case so it is yet an open question where the case will come up for trial.

## Back From the North.

J. H. Downing has returned from an extended trip through Alberta and other provinces of British America. During his trip he visited Edmonton, Calgary, Fernie and many other lively towns. It is a great country, not only in extent but also in resources and is filling up with new settlers very rapidly. Extensive areas of the country are well adapted to stock raising while other sections are well suited to farming. Oat and barley crops do splendidly but the wheat is often injured by frost resulting in much shriveled grain. Coal is found in immense beds almost everywhere but good saw timber is scarce. Mr. Downing says the sawmills work up any old pole that will make a 2x4. Mr. Downing and his son J. M. Downing will at once gather their horses and ship them to Northern Montana where the range is good and later will take them across the line into Alberta. The duty on horses going into Canada is 20 per cent. ad valorem and the customs officials place the value on the animals.

## Leg Broken.

John W. McDonald, the well known blacksmith who is employed in Dunlap's shop, met with a serious and painful accident Monday evening while shoeing a horse. He was about to finish the job when the horse pulled back on the halter and threw his weight on the foot Mac was holding with such suddenness and force as to throw Mac to the floor, the right leg being broken about four inches below the knee. The knee joint was also severely sprained and some of the ligaments torn loose. Dr. Brown reduced the fracture and the patient is resting as easy as can be expected.

Mac is particularly out of luck with his legs. In '90 while with the army in the Philippines he was kicked on the left leg by a horse and laid up for some time and again in 1900 while still in the islands he received a bullet wound in the same leg the ball plowing a deep furrow in the bone and putting him out of business for several months. A year ago a Condon cayuse took a whack at that same left leg and Mac was off duty for four weeks and now that his good right leg has commenced going wrong he is thinking of getting a new pair of combined spring steel and rubber legs to see if that material will withstand the rigorous knocks of the strenuous life that seems to be the lot of his underpinning.

## Governor Takes Action.

Governor Chamberlain has issued a proclamation to the various peace officers of Grant, Baker, Crook, Wheeler and Harney counties urging them to be particularly vigilant in suppressing lawlessness and disorder which may arise as a result of disputes between the sheep and cattle owners or the settlers and outside stockmen. The governor says in conclusion:

"In the event of any trouble which the local authorities are unable to control an appeal to the state will meet with such response as the law will warrant in such emergency."

F. J. Super, a safe and lock expert, of Portland, is here this week taking down the steel cells in the old jail building preparatory to setting them up in their permanent quarters in the new court house.

## John Hire was in town yesterday from Matney. He sent out his last load of last year's crop to market yesterday and Monday will commence cutting 450 acres more to supply another year's hauling.

Rev. and Mrs. Edw. Curran, of Forest Grove, arrived yesterday to visit her mother, Mrs. E. Meek, of Ferry Canyon. They will remain about two weeks. Mr. Curran was formerly pastor of the Congregational church here and both have many friends in this vicinity.

## Plant Trees.

My attention is now directed to Condon—just now one of the most flourishing little towns in Eastern Oregon. I have seen this town grow from a sheep herder's cabin to a city of pretentious rising brick buildings.

Now, while all the buildings and fences are comparatively new, it might be well for the citizens to note conditions just a little. I know this is hard to do, because all seem moved with the same impulse in the grand scramble for the almighty dollar. What spirit of economy prompted the county authorities to withhold a few dollars worth of water from the rows of beautiful Carolina poplars in the court house block and thus change a thing of beauty—the property of the people—to a lot of scrawny, dead and dying limbs?

Of course we know that the water supply is somewhat short but not so short that these trees should be starved to death. The city authorities are now putting forth great efforts to keep ahead with the water supply but there are quite a number of private wells that might be utilized to good advantage on trees and shrubs. Everyone should take a pride in setting out some trees. Every tree in successful growth adds to the beauty, value and homelike attractiveness of the town. It is well, in setting out trees, to remember that some varieties drink up more water from the soil than do others. The poplars are all greedy drinkers of water and in an upland place like Condon it might be well to avoid that variety and set out the more conservative spruces. The spruce trees and the most hardy, for Condon, are the box elder and the locust. There are several beautiful specimens of the locust now growing in Condon; one or two on the old Hanshaw property and an especially fine one on the property of E. W. Moore. Judge Dunn, Messrs. Fraser, Reischer, Pitzer, Springston and many others are making splendid efforts to grow trees—efforts that are most commendable and worthy of being emulated. Now just take a look at those beautiful locust trees and then prepare to set out some of your own this Fall. A. A. Carothers and L. W. Darling each have a fine grove of locusts the former being the finest grove in the county and both show what the locust will do. But when one can't have a whole grove it might be possible to have a few trees and it is better to have one or two well kept, thrifty trees than a greater number of half starved ones. You can carry water, if necessary, to a single, thrifty tree when you might neglect all if you had a larger number. UNCLE TOBY.

## County School Matters.

School Superintendent Neal has prepared his annual report from which we glean the following:

There are in the county 1221 persons of school age of whom 631 are males and 590 are females. Of these 885, 463 males and 422 females, have been enrolled during the year. The average daily attendance was 595. Fifty-six teachers were employed of which 15 were males and 41 females the former receiving an average salary of \$45 per month and the latter an average of \$43. Thirty-two of these were subscribers to some educational journal. There are 38 organized districts 24 of which made reports to the county superintendent as required by law. One school house was built during the year. The total receipts for the year were \$26130.33. Expenditures \$18407.76.
