A fatal accident occurred at Portland last Friday when the foot walk of the Morrison street bridge collapsed and carried with it into the river about 150 men, women and children. Two persons, a young lady and a boy, were killed outright and a large number were seriously injured. A large crowd had congregated on the bridge to witness the feat of an armless man swimming the Willamette river. As the swimmer neared the finish the crowd surged forward to get a better view when the bridge gave way.

### Pope Pius X.

A pope has been elected.  
At 11:40 a. m. Tuesday, Cardinal Baroni was chosen by the Conclave of Cardinals on the seventh ballot. He at once assumed the title of Pius X.  
The new pope was born in the province of Venice in 1835 and although 68 years old is strong and vigorous. He is noted for his purity of life, his upright-ness and his liberal ideas. He is described as a highly cultured, kind hearted, agreeable man.

### Change in Condon Milling Co.

### Chinaman Suicides.

Quong, the self-inflicted Chinese murderer, cheated the gallows of a victim and incidentally saved the tax payers of Gilliam county a long sum, by hanging himself in his cell in the county jail at Heppner last Thursday night. Sheriff Johnson went to Heppner Thursday to bring Quong to Condon but on Friday morning when Sheriff Shutt opened the jail to turn over the prisoner to the officer from this county, Quong was found to have passed beyond the jurisdiction of all earthly courts and sheriffs. His lifeless body was found hanging from the upper bars of the cell suspended by a silk handkerchief.  
Lans, his alleged accomplice in the crime, was in the next cell. He did not adopt the suicide method of getting out of trouble. He was brought here Friday and on Saturday was taken to Fossil and lodged in the Wheeler county jail to await the September term of court in this county.

### A Northern Stock Country.

David Junkin, of Ajax, received a letter a few days ago from his son, Roy Junkin, who is spending the Summer on Kodiak island, one of the Aleutian group off the coast of Alaska. He went there last Spring with Mr. Fry, the Seattle sheepman who bought Barker, Cameron & Piter's sheep here last Spring. The sheep were taken to Kodiak for Summer range and Roy went along to help care for the stock. They took 6000 head of sheep besides some cattle and horses. The letter states that that is a wonderful stock country. The grass grows shoulder high and pure spring water abounds everywhere. The Japan current washes the shores of the Aleutian group, tempering the climate to such an extent that but little snow falls during the winter and the climate is remarkably mild. Stock is said to do well on the range the year around and the grass is always green. These islands may prove to be the country for which many hemmed in Gilliam county sheepmen have been looking. At least, from the tone of Mr. Junkin's letter, the matter might bear investigating.

### Arrested Wild Bill.

Judge Mattingly was in town Monday on legal business. While in town the judge favored this office with a pleasant call. The judge says our Mayville correspondent was in error last week in stating that he is about to succeed Judge Angell as justice of the peace.
