Fish stories are now the order of the day.

A peculiar condition of the markets is that while barley is rapidly advancing beer continues to go down.

Andy Carnegie has given a trifle of \$2,500,000 to his native town in Scotland to be used in conducting experiments in improving the condition of the working people. Andrew would better not be too extravagant or he may go broke before he gets the canal and locks built at Cudde which the GLOBE suggested to him as a worthy project some time ago.

Over in Seattle the burglars are so thick that there is not room for all of them to work in the buildings where the safes are located. The other morning, in broad daylight, three cracksmen removed a safe from a building into the street and there drilled, blew open and robbed it surrounded by an admiring audience of citizens and one or two policemen. Of course they got safely away. This shows that Seattle is nothing if not aggressive and original and Portland will have to bid up if she holds first place in this line of enterprise.

**EASTERN WHEAT CROP.**

The estimates of the Eastern wheat crop, made by crop expert W. B. Snow, of the agricultural department, are not encouraging. The finger of the agricultural department is on the wheat crop of the United States from the day the seed is covered in the ground until it returns to the granaries, a golden stream. Therefore the estimates made by the department are about correct.

So far as threshing has progressed in the Eastern states the average is very low. In fact the crop is a disappointment to the experts and the farmers who have been in close touch with the situation.

The heavy straw and the thrifty appearance of the crops led to the belief that the Central states would yield an average crop. Such is not the case. In the Middle West, where the great bulk of the American wheat crop grows, the yield is lower than for several years.

Threshing results to date have been received covering operations of from one to a half dozen machines from widely scattered sections and the showing is significant. In Putnam county, Indiana, the average to date is nine bushels; in Illinois, Marion county shows five bushels; Clay five to 15; in Iowa, Hamilton county gives 12 bushels; Clinton seven to 11; while Marion county, Missouri, shows eight to 11 bushels.

Portions of Kansas and Nebraska are failing to make good early promise, but generally speaking the yields in these states are satisfactory. It is apparent that in spite of an increase of more than 2,000,000 acres in area harvested, the winter wheat crop will be little if any larger than last year.—East Oregonian.

**PEACE, WHEN THERE IS NO PEACE.**

Apropos of the discussion now going on in the press all over the country relative to the cause and cure of the horrible crimes which so frequently of late have led to the lynching and burning and flaying of criminals, north and south, the following somewhat out of the ordinary but not altogether illogical view of the matter from an exchange may be of interest:

"Danville, Illinois, has just re-enacted the Evansville, Indiana, butchery. Twenty-one people were shot by the sheriff while attempting to storm the jail and lynch a colored rapist. The crowd had just lynched and burned a Negro. Yes, capitalism produces conditions that are lovely indeed! There is always a cause for every effect. In view of the many killings and burnings of Negroes for unmentionable crimes, is it not well that we look into the matter from a historical standpoint and see if there is not something wrong. At the close of the war an Atlanta, Ga., newspaper printed this:

"There have been four years of war in which the Southern white men have practically all been in the army. They remained at home and raised the supplies for the army and for the women and children of the Confederacy.

Without him the South could never have carried on such a war with her powerful antagonist. And during all that time not a Southern woman has complained of maltreatment or insult from the black man. His conduct has been admirable and no people would have behaved better under such conditions."

"Why this change? Why was the colored man tractable and faithful then and not now? The same question applies to the white man. The increase of crime among the white citizens is just as great as among the colored. Why? There must be something in the changed social conditions that produces this effect. The concentration of wealth and power in fewer and fewer hands the lessening of opportunities to rise from the ranks of labor, the corruption in official life, the flaunting of stolen wealth in the faces of the despoiled, the longing for a part of the richness of life which their toil makes possible, the uncertainty of the means of life—all these are at the bottom of the increase in crime. There will be no change in the strife until the causes for it are removed. Why foolishly cry "peace" when there is no peace.

"I hope you each have a good wife," said Bishop Fowler, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the course of a recent address to some ministerial candidates. "If you have not, get one, and don't marry her because she is pious. Marry her because she has good, common sense. If I had two women to choose from, one having common sense and the other only religion, I would take the woman with common sense every time."
