Marshal Armstrong Shot.

In an altercation which occurred yesterday afternoon at the Summit saloon between Frank Palmer and City Marshal Armstrong the latter received a gun shot wound in the left knee which may leave him a cripple for life.

As near as can be ascertained at this writing the trouble started on the previous day when the marshal had some words with Mr. Palmer's wife about the use of city water. At the time of the trouble Palmer called Armstrong to one side, between the saloon building and Barker's new building to call him to account for the occurrence of the day before. The men had some words when Palmer fired a shot and started to back off towards the saloon door. Armstrong followed him and Palmer fired three more shots the last one taking effect in Armstrong's left knee. The injured man was taken to Dr. Wood's office where his wound was dressed and he was later taken home. The bullet is imbedded in the head of the bone below the knee joint and was not recovered.

Palmer went to the sheriff's office and gave himself up. He was placed under \$3000 bond for his appearance, for hearing this afternoon.

A Farmer's Pool.

Four years ago in a certain district in Marion county the farmers met one evening in their local school house and formed a pool of their wheat crop. The scheme was an experiment pure and simple and even the farmers themselves did not know, at that time, whether or not it was practicable but they argued that if pooling issues was a good thing for railroad companies and grain buyers it should not be a very bad thing for the farmers. Of course the newspapers, business men, and other smart people, ridiculed the project a plenty. They called it a "farmer's trust" and sneered at it in their steeles at the ridiculousness of a lot of fool farmers thinking that a granger had sense enough to secure, through organization and a little scheming, a better price for his production than that which the buyers had, in the past, been pleased to give him. The farmers said nothing, however, and sawed their wheat crop came around, instead of having a great number of small individual holdings of only a few hundred bushels each, they had one big lot of wheat aggregating thousands of bushels—a job lot, if you please, which was of so much importance to the buyers and exporters that they were hungry to buy it and willingly paid an advanced price. The result was that the farmers who were in the pool realized a better price for their wheat than did those who were outside of it and who sold their small crops in the old fashioned, individual way.

Since that time the "pooling movement" has grown in Marion county until not only wheat but hops, wool mohair—in fact almost every important product of the county, is thus pooled and sold in big lots and at much better prices than were obtainable under the old system.

The application of all this to the farmers of Gilliam county may be found in the query: If pooling crops for market pays in Marion county why will it not pay in Gilliam? If buyers will pay a higher price per bushel for a lot of a quarter or half a million bushels than they will for a wagon load or a small crop why would it not pay the farmers here to form a pool?

Such a proposition is at least worth investigating. There is no danger of the farmer getting more than his produce is worth under any conditions.

"I advocate a congress of powers and the adoption of a rule of one soldier for each 1000 inhabitants.

"Let soldiers become artisans and farmers and thus relieve the world of one million parasites whose sole business is useless war."

Hand Mangled by Shot Gun.

John Parks, of Trail Fork, who is visiting relatives on Weston mountain near the town of Weston, recently met with a serious and painful accident the details of which are thus given by the Weston correspondent of the Pendleton Tribune:

He was out hunting with a muzzle loading shot gun, one barrel being loaded with a double charge. Seeing a cougar he took a shot at it with results far more disastrous to himself than to the frightened beast which escaped uninjured.

The gun burst into fragments and the entire palm of Mr. Parks' hand was blown off, the ghastly wound extending to the wrist. He also lost the two middle fingers and one-half of the index finger.

The burning his hand received from the powder prevented much loss of blood and he also grasped it firmly at the wrist with his un wounded hand while making his way to the home of Joe Hyatt, who at once brought him to town in a buggy.

The wound was a frightful one splitting the hand into two mangled parts which fell apart as soon as the handkerchief bandage was removed. Notwithstanding the ugly nature of the wound Dr. Best has hopes of saving the remainder of the patient's hand.
