OFFICIAL DUTY.

The appearance of typhoid should be a matter of grave concern to every citizen. There must be a cause for the appearance of this dread disease and the Globe continues of the same opinion as before that the root of the evil is to be found in the filthy condition of the old sewer. The city officials carry a heavy responsibility in this matter. It is not a question of financial policy or of personal or political expediency that they are up against. The health, and the very lives of their own and their neighbor's families is, to a great extent in their hands. If the town is not now in the best possible sanitary condition it should be made so as speedily as possible and on the men who have accepted the city offices and subscribed to a solemn oath to enforce the laws, including section 19 of Article XII of the city charter, rests the burden of seeing that such work is properly done.

MAY COME VIA CONDON.

Commenting on the recent visit of C. J. Mills, of the O. R. & N. Co. to Prairie City, and his statement to the people there that "You may get a railroad in here sooner than you expect it," the Oregonian correspondent at that place says: "The most natural pass for a road through the Blue mountains, it is claimed, is by the way of the headwaters of the John Day river and across to the source of Burnt river. It is believed that the O. R. & N. is planning a road from some point above The Dalles through this way to Huntington. It would serve as a cut-off for the main line and open up a country rich in natural resources." It is probable that if this plan is carried out the new road will leave the main line at Arlington coming via Condon and crossing the low saddle, south east of here, into the John Day country. This route has been discussed for several years and is considered by railroad men as being perfectly feasible.
