NEW COMPANY

IN THE FIELD

Arlington & Pacific Has a Competitor.

CONDON OBJECTIVE POINT

May be Scheme of O. R. & N to Shut Out Independent Company.

The Columbia River & Central Oregon Railroad Company was incorporated in Portland last Saturday with a capital stock of \$500,000. The avowed purpose of the company is to build, equip and operate a railway from Arlington to Condon. The incorporators are John C. Ainsworth, Henry F. Conner and Lewis Gerlinger, all Portland men, and they claim that the company is financed by Eastern men of ample capital who have other extensive railroad and manufacturing interests on the Coast and that the work of construction will begin at once. In addition to the direct line between Condon and Arlington the new company proposes to build a line from the mouth of the John Day river, up that stream to Condon and also from Condon, across the Rock creek gorge to Lone, on the Heppner branch. This was later qualified by Mr. Ainsworth who stated that the Arlington-Condon line is to be built but that whether the others depends upon circumstances. Certain it is that if all these lines are pushed to completion they will make Condon a rather important railroad center even if it does keep the wild eyed Gilliam county cow hustling to keep off the numerous tracks.

The Arlington & Pacific Railway Co., which was incorporated last Winter by Messrs. Simmons, Smiles and Findlay, of Portland, for the purpose of building a road from Arlington to Condon, has already done considerable preliminary work towards making its claims good. Right of way has been secured from the county, cities and individuals. Preliminary surveys have been made and a general outline of the route has been practically determined upon. A representative of the company has recently returned from New York, where he went to arrange for the sale of the bonds and he reports that no trouble will be experienced in that quarter, he having the assurance of capitalists there that ample funds are available for the purpose. Upon his return to Portland an effort was made to make the customary traffic arrangement with the O. R. & N. and there came the "sticking point." The big company wanted time to consider the matter and when they were later called upon for an answer, so the A. & P. officials claim, the announcement was made that another company was preparing to build through the same territory and that it already has assurance of satisfactory traffic arrangements with the O. R. & N.

This would indicate that the O. R. & N. is really behind the new project and the fact that Mr. Ainsworth will not positively deny that they are interested lends some color to this belief.

Meanwhile the A. & P. people announce that they expect to commence work on their line in about 30 days regardless of competing lines or the lack of traffic arrangements, and that if the winter is not too severe, they expect to have it completed to Olex by next Spring and on into Condon next Summer.

It is well known that the O. R. & N. has always looked upon the Condon country as its own particular territory, and that it resents the efforts of any independent concern to give the people here the transportation facilities which are so much needed, preferring to have the country wait the pleasure of the Harriman interests in the matter. Officials of the O. R. & N. have made the statement within a year that that company stands ready to parallel every mile of road built by an independent company towards Condon and if this is not a cold bluff and if the A. & P. people get into action as soon as they expect, there may be blood on the moon in Gilliam county railway circles 't'er the butternuts bloom again. Condon must have one railroad. We can stand two, however, if the fates decree that there are to be twins.

One thing is certain. Gilliam county is in the public eye today, as never before, as a promising field for railroad construction and in the natural order of things it is reasonable to expect some line to reach Condon before many moons wax and wane above the Gilliam county hills.


