The Condon Drilling Co. started to bring their new 800 foot steam traction well drill from Arlington last week under its own steam but on account of the scarcity of water and fuel along the road the trip was abandoned after reaching Schottler Flat and the big machine will be brought the remainder of the way with horses.

An east bound O. R. & N. passenger train was held up by four masked bandits Wednesday evening 21 miles east of Portland. Express messenger Fred Kurner shot and seriously wounded one of the bandits and the other three beat a hasty retreat without securing any booty. Engineer Barrett, who was used as a shield by the robbers in their assault on the express car, was also slightly wounded in the shoulder by a stray ball from the messenger's gun. The wounded bandit is in a Portland hospital but steadfastly refuses to talk farther than to say that his name is Jim Conner. The others have not yet been apprehended.

Ainsworth Perfecting Plans.

The Globe learned yesterday from a private letter written from Portland by a gentleman who is prominent in business and financial circles in this section of Eastern Oregon, and who has close relations with the gentlemen who are at the head of the Columbia River and Central Oregon R. R. Co., that that company is perfecting its plans as rapidly as possible to build their line of road to Condon. Our informant was authorized by these gentlemen to make the statement that they are preparing to begin work at as early a date as possible. He adds that he believes surveyors will be in the field by the 15th, and that active construction work will be under way during the winter. Mr. Ainsworth gave our informant his personal assurance that the road will be built and that it will be built as a business proposition and not as a scheme for raising bonuses and subsidies and that not a dollar will be asked for for such a purpose.

The railroad outlook becomes more encouraging every week lately and at least three different companies have been showing some signs of getting busy.

A Railroad Meeting.

As per announcement made in this paper last week, a mass meeting of citizens was held in Armory hall last Saturday afternoon at which representatives of the Eastern Oregon Railway Co. submitted a proposition to the people of Gilliam county the acceptance of which will, the railroad people declare, result in the completion of a road from Arlington to Condon within the next few months.

W. A. Campbell, the well known business grower, of Ferry Canyon, called for meeting to order and in the happy and graceful manner peculiar to him stated the object of the meeting and introduced Mr. Hosford, the Mary attorney, who appeared in the capacity of an attorney for the company and who made a few preliminary remarks touching on the urgent necessity for better transportation facilities in this county and the manifold blessings and benefits which will accrue to the people upon the completion of such a project as the one then under consideration. He cited the beneficial effects of the Columbia Southern on conditions in Sherman county, and predicted the same rapid transition in material things in this county upon the completion of this road.

E. C. McDonald, of Spokane, a representative of the Trust Company of the Republic, of New York, was the next speaker his remarks being partly along the same lines that Mr. Hosford followed and partly on the financial aspect of the proposition.

Mr. Morris, president of the company was then introduced and proceeded to submit his proposition. He stated, what would appear to be a self evident fact, that the proposition of building this road is something more than plowing a wagon road; that it is, in fact, a gigantic undertaking the estimated cost being \$750,000. This vast amount of money must be secured by the sale of bonds of the company in New York and, the speaker stated, the men who put money into such railroad projects must first be shown that the people of the country through which the proposed road is to run, want a road, that they will appreciate it, be friendly to it and patronize it with their freight and passenger business when completed. This assurance can best be given the New York people, the speaker said, by the citizens of this county putting their own money in to the project to start it going. He therefore proposed to make a temporary issue of bonds to run for five years and, to start the ball rolling, asks the people of Gilliam county to subscribe for \$150,000 worth of these bonds. With this substantial evidence of the good feeling and friendly spirit existing in the minds of the people of this county towards the project, Mr. Morris felt confident that he could go to New York and readily persuade the bond buyers there that the people here want a road and will appreciate and patronize it when built. He would then, he believed, experience no difficulty in having the remaining \$600,000 of bonds taken.

If the people of this county accept Mr. Morris' proposition by subscribing for a sufficient amount of bonds, that gentleman, for his company, agrees to begin work on the grade within 30 days, it being further stipulated that within 30 days after work on the grade commences the money for the bonds must be paid over to the company or its representative. This money is to be placed in some bank with the understanding that it is to be drawn out only for the purpose of paying for construction work on the proposed road. At the expiration of five years, if the road is completed and in successful operation, a new bond issue will be made and the temporary bonds will be redeemed the holders getting their money back with six per cent. interest.

When Mr. Morris had finished the meeting was immediately adjourned there being no opportunity given the citizens to ask questions or discuss the matter. Mr. Morris has stated, however, that the amount of bonds asked to be taken is the maximum and that rather than let the project drop they might accept a somewhat smaller amount.

Before leaving for Arlington yesterday Mr. Morris asked the Globe to say that perhaps his statement at the meeting Saturday was not quite clear. His intention was to say that the money subscribed for bonds here shall be placed in escrow in a bank to be designated by the subscribers to remain there until the road is completed to Condon, the subscribers then to receive their bonds and Mr. Morris to take down the money. Provided that if the road is not completed to Condon by December 31, 1904, the money to be returned to the subscribers.
