Lost His Right Hand.

J. B. Price, father of Roy Price, and a member of the Condon Drilling Co., met with a most deplorable accident yesterday just before noon while operating one of the company's drills on A. S. Hollen's residence property in this city. By some means his right hand was caught in the heavy cog wheels of the machine and was frightfully mangled. Dr. Brown, assisted by Drs. Bowerman and Lons, removed the hand at the wrist. Mr. Price is well along in years but he displayed wonderful nerve after the painful accident and before being placed under an anesthetic.

Statement From Mr. Neal.

The question having been raised by the Arlington Record as to whether or not School Superintendent Neal holds a certificate which entitles him to hold the office of school superintendent, the Globe took occasion to interview Mr. Neal on the subject and secured from that gentleman, in substance the following statement:

Mr. Neal stated without hesitation that the certificate which he held when elected to the office has expired. He says, and is still of the opinion, however that the certificate which made him eligible to fill the office when elected, holds good throughout the term for which he was elected. Recently, however, he saw an opinion given by the state superintendent in which it is recommended that in cases of this kind the county superintendent should convene his own board of examiners and take the examination for a first grade certificate before them. In obedience to this opinion he has done this during the present week. The above statement, Mr. Neal says, constitute the facts in the case.

The board of examiners have not finished examining Mr. Neal's papers at the time our forms close.

N. Farnsworth returned from Portland Sunday and is busy this week getting ready to open the new First National Bank of Condon. The opening has been delayed for a few days on account of the failure of the charter for the new institution to arrive as soon as was expected.

C. W. Cusfield received a consignment of 92 elk teeth from Southern Oregon Monday among which are a number of beauties. Charley says he got the lot at a bargain and he expects to turn a pretty penny when he disposes of them. He has sent them to Denver to be placed on the market. These bits of ivory are highly prized by members of the Order of Elks and when mounted command fancy prices.

Steve Thomas, stage driver on the Condon-Fossil road met with a serious accident Monday while getting his team ready to start on his drive. One of the horses became fractious and rearing, struck Thomas a stunning blow on the side of the head. He was carried to Dr. Brown's office and given every attention but it was some time before he regained consciousness. His injuries are not considered dangerous however.

Fred Sanders received a telegram Thursday evening stating that his brother, Ben Sanders, had been killed that morning in a boiler explosion. Mr. Sanders was employed as engineer in Fossil Bros. sawmill on South Myrtle creek, when the deplorable accident occurred. He was also passenger at Nugget. Two other men were fatally injured and the mill was totally wrecked. Fred left at once for Arlington to catch the first train on his way home.

The Condon Milling Co. has closed a deal with a Portland house for an electric lighting plant which they will install as soon as the dynamo etc. can arrive from the East. The wire is expected to arrive in a few days and the work of wiring the town will be proceeded with at once. Arrangements have been made with the McMorris Telephone Co. by which their poles will be used for the light wires where possible. The plant will have a capacity of 700 incandescent power lights and will be enlarged as the demand for light increases.

Leslie Matlock and Bruce Kelly, who rode a race with death on the night of the hopper flood last June, to warn the people of lone and intervening points of the impending danger, were tendered a banquet by the people of lone the other night as a token of their appreciation of that heroic act.
