SUCCESS.

Our old friend, Rees Davis, of the Caldwell Tribune, every now and then spills a gem of purest ray, and, talking of "Success" recently, he dropped one of his very best. His own offspring, if so unfortunate as to have any, live in daily hope of his taking off, and rejoice in their hearts when he is safely embalmied and entombed. Success? What a mockery! A taskmaster that drives his devotees to premature graves, murders the sweetest of human sympathies and invokes the eternal curse of Almighty God.

In holding that Charles D. Ott, clerk in a Portland grocery house, was not guilty of perjury, Judge Hanford recently handed down a decision which is likely to have a sweeping effect in the construction of land laws. In brief, the court's decision was that where a home-stead applicant is required to take an oath prescribed merely by a regulation of the interior department, and not by the statute, he is not guilty of perjury if he swears falsely; that perjury can only be committed where false testimony is given under an oath prescribed by the statute.
