They found the men but failed to recognize them as either of the parties wanted. Marshal Sweetin says it was one of the hardest trips he has had for some time. They started out from Umatilla in a gasoline launch but had only made a few miles when the engine, true to the nature of most gasoline engines "bucked" and refused to do its duty. The men were compelled to land and do a "hot foot" act through the sand for several miles.—Arlington Appeal.

County court is in session this week. Mrs. Orie Propst is visiting relatives at Spokane.

Ex-Congressman Moody Indicted.

Ex-Congressman Malcolm A. Moody was indicted by the federal grand jury last Wednesday on a charge of opening a letter not his own. The letter in question is said to have been addressed to Mrs. Conroy, one of the depositors of the Dallas City National Bank, of which Mr. Moody was an officer, and contained a notice from the Controller of Currency to the effect that the final dividend was ready to be paid to the depositors. It is charged that Mr. Moody obtained possession of the letter, opened the same and abstracted the contents from motives of personal gain. Mr. Moody at once requested an immediate trial and his case has been set for the first day of the U.S. Circuit Court at Portland Nov. 16.

Mr. Moody has made a statement in which he expresses his confidence in securing an acquittal and says the whole thing has been trumped up by his political enemies. It seems to be a result of the bitter factional fight which has existed so long in the republican party in Oregon.

Tax Law Invalid.

The Supreme Court last Saturday handed down a decision affirming the decision of the lower court in the case involving the new tax law. The decision declares that there can be no levy made for taxes in Oregon for the coming year unless the defects in the law is remedied by a special session of the legislature.

It is more than probable that Governor Chamberlain will call a special session at once in order that the law may be remedied and that the state, county and city governments may not be without resources. It is probable that other matters will receive attention at the special session among which are the postage road bill and the corporation tax law.

Court at Trail Fork.

The wheels of justice were revolving in Justice Mattingly's court in Trail Fork precinct last Friday, and like "The mills of the gods" they ground exceedingly slow.

The case at issue involved some hog, the property of Josh Hardie and, as the pecky critters had, some time since, sneaked across the line onto W. F. Parks' land and committed sundry depredations, it may be assumed with safety that they were lineal descendants of the famous herd of swine into which the devils were cast some 19 centuries ago. Unfortunately, however the Trail Fork porkers did not follow the example of their illustrious forefathers—and mothers—and rash into the sea with suicidal intent but this may be accounted for by the fact that Trail Fork precinct is a little short on oceans or other large bodies of water this fall, even the supply of fire-water being short on account of the recent Calceolion meeting at Fossil where the supply is said to have been nearly depleted. Had the swine been a little less pig headed, however, they might have sailed for the pig paradise where all the land is an alfalfa patch, shaded by everbearing sweet apple trees and smoke houses are unknown, by taking a header from the wagon road grade leading from Thirty-mile to Trail Fork country. The effect would have been the same as if they had jumped into the sea or went up against a steam power sausage mill. The pigs would have been dead, and would never more have been in a position to promote law suits in Trail Fork. The suit was one of replevin in which Josh Hardie was plaintiff and W. F. Parks defendant. Hardie was represented by J. W. Snover, of this city, and Parks by Attorney Collier, of Fossil. Both these gentlemen displayed legal talent and excellent appetites and the way stewed chicken and other edibles suffered at their hands at meal time lent color to the belief that they might have distinguished themselves to a higher degree in the ministry than in the law. Had the pigs been placed in evidence the attorneys could have devoured them for luncheon but it is not likely that they would have done so as that might have ended the law suit.

The defendant demanded a jury trial and Constable George Hardie at once got busy. He scoured the precinct and by 5 o'clock p. m. had rounded up three jurors and by agreement the case was proceeded with before them. Hardie asked for possession of the hogs and \$25.00 damage. Parks asked for \$7.50 damage done the last time the pigs visited him and \$45.00 for their entertainment at previous times. After a number of witnesses had been examined, the attorneys had made able arguments and the law had been carefully expounded by the court, the jury retired and in an hour returned a verdict giving Mr. Parks damages in the sum of \$6.25.

A motion for a new trial has been filed by the plaintiff and if the same is granted the pig culture question will be further exploited at some future time.

Franchise Granted.

At a council meeting held in Arlington Tuesday evening, a franchise was granted to the Eastern Oregon Railway Co. through that town on the following conditions: The company is to have 60 days from the date of passage of the franchise ordinance to commence work and before work is begun it is to pay to the city of Arlington the sum of \$2,000 for the franchise. A good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$5,000 is to be executed to the city of Arlington, by the company, before work commences binding the company to complete 15 miles of the road and put it in operation within one year.

Should the company begin work and fail to complete 15 miles of the road within one year it will forfeit \$7,000 to Arlington and also lose the franchise.

The Eastern Oregon R.R. Co. is known generally as the Morris company. Their surveyors are now at work in the neighborhood of Olex.

The Alinsworth company has surveyors camped on Rock Creek at T. G. Woodland's ranch. They are, presumably, looking for a route up Spring Hollow.

President Simmons, of the Arlington & Pacific R.R. Co. was in town Sunday. He informed the Globe that his surveyors were then camped two miles this side of the Head place on Rock Creek. They expect to reach Condon with the survey in about two weeks.

Report from Olex says that the Morris people are actively securing right-of-way on Rock Creek, below Olex, and that in some cases condemnatory proceedings have been instituted. The developments at Arlington seem to indicate that Mr. Morris and his associates mean business.

Harvey Riggins.

Harvey Riggins, a pioneer of the Trail Fork country, died at the residence of his son-in-law, John Hawk, Wednesday, of last week, aged about 50 years. He was buried in the I. O. O. F. burial ground at Fossil on Friday.

All Hallow E'en.

Some paint was smeared on the windows and one citizen had his buggy artistically decorated with white paint.
