Governor Chamberlain has put it up to the members of the legislature as to whether or not there will be a special session of that body to remedy the defective tax law. He has sent a letter to each member in which he states that if a majority of the members requests him to call a special session that he will do so provided they also pledge themselves to adjourn as soon as the tax matter is attended to. The governor has taken this stand because of rumors that other legislation may be taken up in the event of a special session being called. The governor is correct in his position. After making such a mess of the tax matter it is well to curtail the power of the present body of law makers as much as possible. If they were allowed to remain in session the full 20 days allowed by law it is hard to tell what further scrapes they might get the state into. Some of the members object to the governor thus shifting the responsibility of an extra session to their shoulders but as they are responsible for the passage of the Phelps law they should be held responsible for the expense to which the taxpayers will be put in having it remedied. It is a pity that they could not be made pay their own expenses while at Salem.

ELIJAH.

In the old days there was a prophet by the name of Elijah. He was a good man, but so poor that his raiment was made of skins. And yet Elijah the Tishbite left a name that has lived through all the centuries of time—a name that will pass from memory only when time ceases to be. But we have a new Elijah the Prophet. And such a prophet! To sinful man and woman he was known a few years ago as John Alexander Dowie, a man who blew in with the winds from Australia without a dollar in his pocket. When the Pacific coast repudiated him and his doctrine he flopped his wings and like a bird of prey settled down on the godless city of Chicago. Suckers were plentiful, and when he unfurled his banner of Zion, recruits flocked to his standard in droves. Being a man of peculiar magnetism and keen business sagacity, he insulted the ministry, reviled the press and damned the medical profession with every breath. He wanted newspaper notoriety. And he got it. And with it he got fresh recruits from the numerous suckers of the City of Wind. And in like manner he annexed their gold and their prospects of the same. Next he founded a city and gathered together a host of 10,000 deluded followers. He created an army of a thousand men dressed in gorgeous uniforms and armed with the Bible. Millions in gold flowed into his rapacious paw, and with each installment came dreams of added greatness and power. Then with a flourish of trumpets he proclaimed to the world that he was the second edition of Elijah the Prophet. Having conquered the wickedness of the Windy City he gathered together his hosts and invaded the sacred soil of New York. He chartered whole trains for his army and traveled himself on a palace on wheels. But the home of the Knickerbocker was wicked, O, so wicked! It refused to take the prophet seriously and likewise declined to part with its gold. And gold is the god of the new prophet! With three thousand followers making a house to house canvass he failed to secure a single convert.

He was jeered, ridiculed, laughed to scorn, and so great was the shame that his wife and son took refuge in a trip to Europe. Such is the history of John Alexander Dowie, self-styled Elijah II. We are witnessing the rise and fall of the greatest egotist and fakir in the history of the American republic. Even now there is dissatisfaction among his own followers and about 150 families are contemplating a settlement in Oregon or Washington far from the maddening Dowie. In the end truth always prevails and the devil takes care of his own.

Although party feeling ran high and party lines were sharply drawn in the New York campaign that ended with the recent election, a notable political incident of the year was the endorsement by the republicans of Judge O'Brien for his reelection to the court of appeals. Judge O'Brien is a democrat, but he had sat on the bench with credit to himself, his profession and the state, and it was commonly agreed that that the judiciary would be the gainer if he were given another term. Hence his support by both parties and a reelection that reflects the unanimous wishes of his fellow citizens. The election of Judge O'Brien is significant in showing a growing sentiment in favor of taking the courts out of politics. An idea has long prevailed that the nomination and election of judges should be wholly apart from the selection of other officers. Experience has shown that it is not always possible to place the best men on the bench when politics is taken into consideration and the judiciary is drawn into the turmoil that is often associated with the selection of other public servants. Above all, it is gradually becoming an accepted fact that the judiciary should be divorced from partisanship, and that in the selection of men for the bench the main things to consider are not a man's political affiliations, but his character, honesty, intelligence, legal ability and judicial qualifications. When the bench is chosen in this way there is little doubt that it will be stronger, more impartial and better equipped to interpret the law and to deal out justice fairly.—Spokesman-Review.
