TO ADVERTISE THE FAIR.

Here is a suggestion for the Lewis and Clark Fair board agent the question of advertising the 1905 Fair. Let the board have a large number of cuts made, of some neat design advertising the fair, and supply one to every job printer and country print shop in the state where job printing is done with the request that they be run on every job of envelopes turned out of the shop, provided, of course, that the customer does not object. Such a method would give the fair a large amount of excellent advertising and would be, in a way, in the form of a united petition from every section of the state to the people of the world at large to come to the Fair. The cuts should be small (not to exceed two inches square) and clear and could be furnished free by the board at a very small cost. While it is impossible for many country publishers to accept and publish the long articles of advertising matter sent out by the board it is not likely that a single printer would refuse to make use of a design of this kind in the manner suggested above. Some few of their customers might refuse to allow the design to be used on their work but the number of such would be small.

WOULD PAY HIS OWN WAY.

At least one member of the legislature takes the same view of the responsibility for the defective tax law and the consequent necessity for a special session, as that advanced in this column last week. Writing on the subject to the Oregonian, Representative Charles V. Gallaway says:

"If it is necessary that, the legislature be called in extra session to straighten out the tax law tangle, the duty of the members is plain. We are all responsible for the mistake, both those of us who voted for the bill and those who voted against it. The former did not know the measure was defective, and the latter were probably in a similar state of mind. If any one knew and kept silence, allowing the majority to blunder in ignorance, his responsibility is by no means lessened. If called, the proper thing for us to do would be to remedy our mistake and adjourn, accepting no compensation, either per diem or mileage, for the service. We should pay for our own blunders.

"If we meet under such conditions, the business in hand will be attended to with expedition; there will be no hanging on to monkey with other subjects. There need be very few clerks. The expense of such a session would be small indeed.

"We can afford to do this much to put things to rights, and such is our duty."

AN AGE OF GRAFT.

Are we drifting into an age of graft and boodling? It would really seem so. From the north, and the south, and the east, and the west, comes revolting stories of graft, graft, graft. Graft so thick and so rotten that it is a stench in the nostrils of all honorable men. The art of grafting seems to have been added to the curriculum of the nation within the past few years and experience, being a costly but thorough teacher, has been instilling the principles persistently. New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and Minneapolis have proven the best learners of the new art, but there is a sort of a preparatory school in other and smaller cities that may graduate into the larger university of graft. Government and state officials are frequently exposed to the public view as adepts in the art of grafting.

Senators, congressmen and others are in the thick of the mire. Mayor and police chiefs consider it their especial privilege and hold up their hands in horror if one of the common people presumes to expostulate.

And even the policemen and the bailiffs and the rest of the little fellows must have their share of the spoils. But the responsibility for this condition of affairs may be laid to a great extent at the doors of the better elements of the various communities.

You ask why? It is the privilege of every American citizen of legal age to go to the polls and cast his vote for whomsoever he chooses. Do you do your duty in this respect? Do you cast your ballot for men who are above corruption? Do you ask your upright neighbor to go with you and try to put the boodler and the grafter out of office?

We are certainly drifting into an age of grafting, and honorable men who fail to grasp the significance of this statement are responsible in a great measure for making this deplorable condition of affairs possible.
