Sacajawa Statue Association.

An association has recently been formed in Portland which is known as the "Sacajawa Statue Association" having for its object the creation of a fund with which to erect a suitable monument to the memory of Sacajawa, the "Bird Woman," who was the only woman to accompany the famous Lewis and Clark expedition on their memorable trip across the Rocky Mountains and on to the Oregon country. Sacajawa was a member of the Shoshone or Snake tribe but was captured when a child by her people's inveterate enemies, the Blackfeet. She was carried to their country and held as a slave and when 16 years old was sold to a French Canadian trapper who made her his wife. When Lewis and Clark reached the Blackfoot country they engaged the Frenchman and his wife as guides and interpreters and long before the arduous journey was over Sacajawa had won the respect and esteem of the Captains by her mild and engaging qualities. In times of peril and extraordinary hardships she often by her skill in woodcraft and navigation rendered valuable service to the party and in no small way is much of the success of the expedition due to her many admirable qualities.

As stated above an association has been formed to properly commemorate the services which this humble Indian slave girl has rendered civilization in doing what she has done towards opening up the boundless country now known as the Pacific Northwest and it is the desire of the promoters of this project that every town and community in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana should have an opportunity to assist in the work. It is essentially a women's work and the women of almost every town of importance in Oregon are organizing for the enterprise. Mrs. Eva Emery Dye, the talented author of "The Conquest" is president of the State Association and every one who has read that great book will be interested in the story of Sacajawa.

Mrs. T. C. Nicklin, of this city, has been named as vice-president of the association for Condon and she will be pleased to receive contributions to the monument fund. The cost of the monument is to be about \$7,000 and of this amount Condon is only asked to contribute \$10. Mrs. Nicklin has "Sacajawa" buttons for sale at ten cents each and membership in the association costs only 50 cents. It is the intention of the association to have the monument completed before the opening of the Lewis and Clark Fair and it will be temporarily erected on the Fair grounds and later will be placed in a permanent position in one of the Portland parks.

National Live Stock Association.

The Seventh Annual Convention of the National Live Stock Association will meet in Portland on January 12, '04. In counties where no association exists the county commissioners may appoint one delegate to this convention. Any bona fide stockman may become a member of the association by paying an initiation fee of \$10.00 and a yearly due of the same amount. The meeting will be an important one and many matters of first importance to the stock interests will come up for discussion. Among these will be the subjects of Forest reserves, packers' combination against stock growers, transportation, arid lands and the interesting subject, "Producing Meat Without Corn." At the same time the National Wool Growers' Association will meet in Portland and the two conventions coming at the same time will make a particularly interesting occasion to stockmen. It is to be hoped that Gilliam county will have some representatives at this meeting.
