Persons representing farmers in ten states assembled in Chicago the other day to discuss a scheme for merging their local associations into a national organization with a view to securing better prices for their products, or such of their products as will bear storage for many months without much deterioration. American farmers produce a surplus of many things which they must dispose of abroad or not at all. In order to dictate prices, therefore, they must not only combine with one another, but they must combine with farmers the world over and come to an understanding with them about prices. There is no good reason why the farmers should not make such a scheme work if the promoters will stay with the propaganda work and educate their brother farmers up to the idea that they have the strength and intelligence to carry it through. The farmers have the same right to organize that the manufacturers and railroads have and unless they take advantage of it they will continue to give and take such prices for what they have as the other fellows please to fix. Organization is what the farmers need.

The Portland Telegram issued a superbly illustrated "industrial edition" last Monday containing 48 pages devoted to the industrial growth and development of Oregon. The paper contains a mass of information regarding the state covering the industries and resources of certain sections pretty fully. It is noticeable, however, that the only mention of Gilliam county receives is the following two lines: "Arlington, a railroad and river town, is the county seat of Gilliam county." The fact that the Telegram has made the same misstatement in former special editions and continues to repeat it year after year, in spite of the fact that the error has been repeatedly pointed out, shows that that paper must draw its information about this county from rather antiquated sources. The statement would have been correct fourteen years ago but for that length of time Condon has been the county seat. We would suggest that the Telegram furnish its special edition man with a primary geography of Oregon and then secure a correspondent in Gilliam county to furnish him with a little up-to-date information.

Ex-Governor T. T. Geer has purchased an interest in the Salem Statesman and will henceforth do the heavy editorial work on that journal. The ex-Governor is evidently a lucky individual. When his aspirations for a senatorial toga fell short it was thought that he was done for completely but this sudden rise to fame and honorable position shows that he is more than ever strictly "It." This shows on what narrow margins our destiny sometimes turns. Had Mr. Geer been sent to the senate he might never have become a Salem editor. It must make him tremble to think of his close rub.

Col. W. F. Butcher, of Baker city, one time Democratic nominee for congress in this district, is out in a somewhat vehement protest against the portage road. The colonel got a few votes in the Columbia river counties when he was a candidate for congress but it is evident that either he will not be a candidate next time or else that he feels that he will be satisfied with a still smaller number of ballots. The people in this neck o' woods want a portage road and they mean to have it.

The officers of the new institution are all well known and substantial business men whose names in connection with any business enterprise adds to its solidity and soundness. Condon has long needed such an institution and this one will no doubt fill all requirements of the town along this line.

It is also understood from Arlington that Mr. Morris failed to make good his part of the contract with the city of Arlington for the franchise and right of way through that town and the deal is off.

To School Clerks, Gilliam County, Oregon.
Gentlemen:—

I will send you, in a few weeks, blanks for taking the annual census reports in order that you may comply with the law which requires every district clerk to enroll annually during the last week in February, for school purposes, all persons in his district over four and under twenty years of age.

The census thus taken shall be submitted to the directors at the annual meeting, and all corrections necessary shall then be made, and the clerk shall file his original report in his office, the same to be and remain a part of the permanent records thereof, and the clerk shall include a copy of the annual census report in his annual report to the county superintendent.

School clerks must report to the county clerk the rate of special tax levy on or before the first day of January in order to have the same computed with the general tax.
