### Harriman in Portland.

E. H. Harriman, the railroad magnate, spent several days in Portland during the past week looking after his immense transportation interests in the northwest.

While he was detained in Portland several days by the serious illness of Mr. Gerry who was traveling in his party as a guest he was unable to take up a number of important matters which were under consideration when he started west because of the unavoidable absence of President Muller, of the O. R. & N., from Portland; that gentleman being called East by the serious illness of a member of his family.

The proposed road to Condon was one of the projects which was to have been discussed and settled at this time but which was necessarily passed up for the present but it was understood from Mr. Harriman's statement that the matter will be taken up with Mr. Muller as soon as Mr. Harriman reaches New York.

In discussing the Condon project with an Oregonian reporter Mr. Harriman stated that he proposes to develop the territory through which his lines pass as rapidly as possible and that he presumed the line through Gilliam county would be reached soon but that until he could confer with Mr. Muller on the subject he could make no definite statement as to when the matter will be taken up for action.

"We will go into the new districts in our territory as rapidly as possible," said Mr. Harriman to the Oregonian, "and will not even wait for a revenue producing traffic to be developed before affording the facilities, although we must, of course, have some assurance of sufficient development to warrant the construction of a road."

The foregoing may be reasonably taken as the most encouraging development yet made in regard to railroad matters in this county and is the first time the public has been directly advised that Mr. Harriman's attention has been directed to the urgent need for better transportation facilities in this county in connection with his lines.

The statement that his policy is not to wait for a revenue producing traffic if the district entered promises development is also encouraging as it is generally conceded that this county not only offers a paying business to a railroad right on the start but also possesses natural resources which guarantee a truly wonderful development as soon as the road is built.

Gilliam county people will hope to hear something definite from New York in the near future of a most encouraging nature regarding the much wanted road.

### Recent Deaths.

**Charles L. Davenport.**

Charles Lawrence Davenport, an old and respected resident of Mayville, died at that place last Saturday aged about 81 years. Mr. Davenport had been very feeble for several years and a few weeks ago he had the misfortune to fall down a flight of stairs in the Mayville hotel where he made his home, by which his leg was broken and he was otherwise injured. Because of his advanced age and general weakness he was not able to recover from the shock but lingered until Saturday when death released him from his sufferings.

Deceased was born in Kirkland, Ohio, January 12, 1820, and there he grew to manhood. He learned the millwright trade in his home town and later settled at La Fayette, La., where he was engaged in the stove factory business until 1876 when he removed with his family to Caldwell, Kansas, remaining at that place six years. In 1882 he came to the Pacific Coast and two years later he settled on Key's Flat, near Mayville, which place has been his home ever since. He was married in La Fayette, Indiana, in 1857 his wife preceding him to the Great Beyond several years. One son, Will Davenport, of Mayville, survives him.

He was a man of sterling integrity and high character and was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

His funeral took place at Mayville, Sunday, under the direction of the local lodge of Odd Fellows, he having been a member of that order since he was 23 years of age. Rev. Flowers conducted the services.

**B. F. Tennis.**

B. F. Tennis, of Arlington, the well known wheat buyer, died at St. Mary's hospital, in Walla Walla Monday evening. He went to the hospital about a week ago suffering from an attack of pleurisy to which he finally succumbed as above stated.

Deceased was well known all over the county and had many friends. He came to this county from California several years ago.

**Wilder.**

Word was received here Sunday that Mrs. Kate Wilder, of Hillsboro had died Saturday evening. Mrs. Wilder was a sister of E. I. McKinney, the well known sheepman of this county. A husband and several children survive her.

**Smith.**

E. T. Smith died suddenly at his home in the Flx building last Saturday morning of pneumonia. He had been in the employ of Harrison & Wells all Summer as a herder and had come to town several weeks ago and had since been drinking heavily. He was a single man about 50 years old. A married sister resides at Hillsboro, this state, whose husband is county treasurer of Washington county. The remains were interred in Mount Moriah cemetery Sunday afternoon.

**Sanders.**

Joseph Sanders, a young man 19 years old, whose home was on the John Day river, near Ajax, died on Monday of typhoid pneumonia, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Geo. Cram, in Arlington. He was buried in the Arlington cemetery.

**White.**

Everett White, of Arlington, died suddenly at that place Saturday afternoon of heart disease. He was 23 years old and unmarried. He was engaged in the photograph business at Arlington and was highly respected by all who knew him.
