Does not common justice demand that the Grand Rapids man be sent up for life? There should be no 'scabs' in the bribery industry."

## INEVITABLE STATE CONTROL.

Elbert Hubbard, editor of the Philistine magazine, one of the most original thinkers in the United States, has figured out the railroad question in a practical manner and here is what he says: "The trusts are a movement of nature in the interests of mankind. The people will yet own and control the railroads, just as we do the postoffice. The state will own the railroads, just as we control the highways where once everybody paid toll. But the change cannot come by voting out the strong men who have brought railroading up to its present high degree of excellence, and putting in dissatisfied walking delegates. We will make terms with these strong men and retain them in power. "The nation can only be strong by using the efforts of its strong

men. These men in power have proved their fitness and the men who operate the railroads of the co-operative commonwealth will be men trained and educated by the men now in power. And the change will come as quietly and imperceptibly as a change in schedule. It will be evolution not revolution.

"I believe in co-operation, even with people whom we do not like, if it will bring us any nearer our ideal. Never was there a time when men of steady judgement were more in demand. We want hopeful, earnest men, and above all, men of patience, kindness and good cheer. We want the opportunist—the man who does what he can, the best he can, and who tomorrow will do the same thing."

## To School Clerks, Gilliam County, Oregon.

Gentlemen:— I will send you, in a few weeks, blanks for taking the annual census reports in order that you may comply with the law which requires every district clerk to enroll annually during the last week in February, for school purposes, all persons in his district over four and under twenty years of age. The census thus taken shall be submitted to the directors at the annual meeting, and all corrections necessary shall then be made, and the clerk shall file his original report in his office, the same to be and remain a part of the permanent records thereof, and the clerk shall include a copy of the annual census report in his annual report to the county superintendent. School clerks must report to the county clerk the rate of special tax levied on or before the first day of January in order to have the same computed with the general tax.
