Legislature Adjourns.

Contrary to expectations the special session of the legislature finished its work last Wednesday evening and adjourned sine die.

The session was unique in the annals of lawmaking in Oregon in the amount of business transacted during such a short session.

The Phelps tax law was repealed and the old law, with a few minor changes, was re-enacted. The \$300 exemption law was restored.

The law relating to the association of criminals in the penitentiary was so amended that persons convicted under the old law may be excused under the provisions of that law.

A bill was passed appropriating \$100,000 for the purpose of securing right of way for the government canal at Celilo and empowering the board of state portage commissioners to secure right of way and transfer it to the government.

The game law was amended to prohibit the killing of elk until September, 1910.

A large number of bills were passed during the session of various laws and orders in the state.

The session of the session was in the bill making gambling a felony in Oregon. The introduction of such a bill was a surprise to every one and especially to the gambling fraternity of Portland. It passed the house with a good majority and was carried by the chief clerk of the house to the bar of the senate and handed to the senate page to be given to President Brownell. That gentleman says the bill never reached him and what became of it is the mystery of the session.

A strong lobby of gamblers were on hand from Portland and it is hinted that by some trick of ledgering some of these gentlemen intercepted the bill and effectively "put it asleep." The members of the legislature are to be commended for their prompt work in disposing of the public business. The measures passed seem to be generally unobjectionable and what was done was done quickly.

To School Clerks, Gilliam County, Oregon.

Gentlemen:— I will send you, in a few weeks, blanks for taking the annual census reports in order that you may comply with the law which requires every district clerk to enroll annually during the last week in February, for school purposes, all persons in his district over four and under twenty years of age. The census thus taken shall be submitted to the directors at the annual meeting, and all corrections necessary shall then be made, and the clerk shall also file his original report in his office, the same to be and remain a part of the permanent records thereof, and the clerk shall include a copy of the annual census report in his annual report to the county superintendent.

School clerks must report to the county clerk the rate of special tax levy on or before the first day of January in order to have the same computed with the general tax.
