

CANAL RIGHT OF WAY.

No more appropriate Christmas gift could have been made to the people of Oregon by the legislature than the appropriation for securing a right of way for the government canal at Celilo. An open river is a necessity to the people of Oregon. If the state is to continue to move forward in the work of progress and development and the action of the legislature at this time was most opportune and highly commendable.

Former sessions of our state law making body have been guilty of many sins of omission and commission but no man who has the best interests of the state at heart can find fault with the recent action on the canal matter.

It was also a part of wisdom to allow the portage appropriation to stand for, if any further hitch should come up in regard to the canal, a measure of relief is still at hand in the portage road. If, on the other hand, the government should at once begin to push construction work on the canal the portage commissioners can drop the railway project at any time.

The order from the secretary of war setting aside a large sum of money for the purpose of removing obstructions in the river immediately below the rapids, coming as it did almost at the same time as the legislative action, is encouraging. It really begins to look as though the opening of the Columbia was an assured fact and that without very many more years of tiresome waiting. "Hope deferred maketh the heart sick," but that hope about to be realized invariably makes the patient feel better. In this case the Inland Empire is the patient and she starts off into the new year feeling pretty well thank you.

Politicians are beginning to prick up their ears for the coming campaign.

President Roosevelt talks pretty straight about Columbia in his late message to Congress.

The burning question with many republican editors just now is "who shall the democrats nominate for president?"

Back in Boston it has been so cold lately that the natives could not bake their beans properly and much suffering has been the consequence.

If Uncle Samuel is to annex Canada, Cuba and Panama why not go a step or two further and take over Mexico, all of Central and South America, China, Japan and Siberia. If this expansion business is such a good thing why not "go the whole hog" and have done with it.

The awful holocaust in the Iriquoise theater in Chicago, last week should be taken as a warning by every town in the country. Existing laws, having for their object the safety of visitors to public halls and places of amusement should be rigidly enforced and where such laws do not exist they should be enacted. An element of danger exists in every building packed with people and a sudden cry of "fire" or any other startling incident may create a panic which will be awful in its consequences. Too great care cannot be exercised by the managers of such places and any reaction of laws designed to pro-

tect the public should be properly punished.

Because no emergency clause was attached to the bill reviving the \$300 exemption, the law will not be effective soon enough to apply to the assessment of 1904. The assessment for that year will be made upon property that is taxable on March 1. The exemption law does not go into effect until March 23. The Attorney General expresses the hope that some way may be found to make the law effective on the 1904 assessment, but his opinion from a hasty consideration of the matter is that no exemptions can be allowed to house holders next year. It is unfortunate that the emergency clause was omitted from that measure, for it was the desire of the people and was supposed to be the intention of the Legislature that all important laws should be effective at once. While the peace, health and safety of the state does not depend upon giving every householder a \$300 tax exemption next year, yet the emergency is as great as in a number of other cases in which it was declared to exist. If the exemption were to be revived at all, it should have been put into force and effect at once.—Oregonian.
