He was a member of good standing of Igo Grange, at Alville, and also of the C. M. A. lodge at that place. He was a devoted and dutiful son and brother.

His parents, brother, and one sister are left to mourn his untimely end and to them will be extended the sympathy of many friends.

The funeral took place at Alville Saturday the services being conducted by Rev. F. C. Flowers, of the First Baptist church, of this place, and by the members of Igo Grange, of Alville.

## Ill in California.

Word reached here Sunday that City Marshal R. E. Armstrong, who left here a few weeks ago to visit friends in California, is in a serious condition in a sanitarium at Calistoga, Napa county. He underwent an operation about Christmas time and was to be operated on again on Wednesday of last week. The trouble is said to be in the spine but the letter intimates that the trouble was caused from the gun shot wound he received in the knee last summer. The letter stated that an X-ray photograph had been made and the bullet located and it was expected it would be removed at the second operation.
