PANAMA.

The worst of the Panama business is the serious doubt that we would have done the same thing had Panama been a British dependency. A bully may be brave but he is contemptible. International law recognizes the government which is in fact in control and each nation determines for itself when to recognize the rebel. But a sense of decency demands that no unseemly haste be made. Haste, in effect, becomes an unfriendly act toward the elder government. In four years the British Government Colombia is an absentee landlord as to Panama, and Panama has my sympathies. Rebellion is an effort toward freedom and local self government. Colombia has been sordid and is open to suspicion of bad faith and of being bought by interests opposed to the canal. I have no good word for Colombia. But a love for Colombia; and I wish if we were to grab the new republic so hastily and tuck it so hastily under the eagle's wing, it had just happened that we had nothing to gain by it. Would we have done it if Panama had been a German colony? Would we have done it had there been no canal question? What does it profit a nation if it gain the whole world and lose its own soul?—C. E. S. Wood in The Pacific Monthly.
