We have received a copy of an address delivered by Charles P. Strain, assessor of Umatilla county, before the county court of that county setting as a board of equalization, on September 23, 1903, in defense of his action in raising the assessment of the O. R. & N. Co. to \$12,000 per mile. It is an able argument and shows Mr. Strain to be a earnest painstaking worker in the cause of just and equitable taxation. He has collected a mass of statistics and facts from all over the country regarding railroad values, earnings and taxation which shows conclusively that his action in the matter was just and proper. To Mr. Strain belongs the honor of having made the first systematic effort to require the transportation companies to pay a just share of the taxes, that has been made in Oregon. The force of his argument is apparent from the fact that after hearing it the court by a unanimous vote refused to allow the petition of the railroad company for a reduction of its assessment.

CRIME OF AN EXCONGRESSMAN.

Ex-Congressman Driggs has been sentenced to one day's imprisonment in jail and to pay a fine of \$10,000 for accepting money in connection with a post-office contract. There was no question of guilt and there ought to have been but slight difference of opinion on the question of punishment. If Driggs' offense was sufficiently serious to warrant the infliction of a fine of \$10,000, it certainly ought to have called for more than one day in jail. The fine will be easily paid. The imprisonment amounts to nothing and the convict will go on his way rejoicing that he has been so slightly inconvenienced.

Had it been a case of equal dishonesty but involving a man less prominent in the community, the result would probably have been different. It would have been a stiff imprisonment and a small fine or no fine at all. Apparently, it is the character of the accused and not of the offense that governs in determining the punishment, which is a most unfortunate rule to prevail in a country where all men are supposed to stand on an equality before the law.

Imprisonment is the best means for correcting evil and preventing wrongdoing. There are hundreds of transgressors in the land who laugh at the law because they know they can be cleared on the payment of fines. A cell has no terrors for them because they are never ushered into one. And if a few of these offenders in the higher walks of life were dealt with as the humble citizens are, perhaps there would be less dereliction among those holding responsible positions.—Spokesman-Review.
