## Time Enough Yet.

Conditions are such at this time, however, that it would require an extraordinary storm to jeopardize the stock interests during the present season. Most of the feed that was on hands last Fall is still in the country and the stock is in fine condition to stand a period of stormy weather.

Old timers recall a winter a good many years ago, however, which was similar to the present one up to the first of February when three feet of snow fell which lasted until the middle of March and intimate that the same thing might possibly occur again. Others say that the seasons are changing and that winters similar to the ones they used to have 20 years ago will never again be experienced in this country. The Globe is not in a position to say which of these surmises is correct but in common with its neighbors, will hope the latter is well founded. To be damped out of the past month of sunshine and gentle zephyrs into a three-foot six-week snow could be, at once uncomfortable and exasperating.

The report which was circulated last Wednesday evening and which appeared in these columns, to the effect that R. E. The probate court was occupied last Friday and Saturday in hearing the petitions from the children of Wilkinson White, esp., of Paper asking to have a guardian appointed for their father.
