Sheriff Alderman, of Tillamook county, committed suicide last Sunday morning by shooting himself through the head. Expert accountants recently discovered a shortage of several thousand dollars in his accounts and a warrant for his arrest was issued Saturday evening which is the supposed cause of the act.

Three homes in Condon, those of Wm. M. Dunlap, John R. Clark and the Wallace family were quarantined Monday morning on account of smallpox. The disease is in a very mild form and as soon as the authorities were aware that the disease existed in the town every precaution was taken to prevent its spread. County Physician Wood yesterday ordered a complete fumigating apparatus from Portland with which to properly fumigate all infected houses. He and Mayor Pitter conferred with Dr. Wm. Hutchinson, state health officer, by phone. If thought necessary today that official will come here tomorrow to assist in enforcing a strict quarantine of the disease.

Contagious Diseases.

When a town is invaded by a contagious or infectious disease it is the duty of every citizen to unite with the authorities to stamp it out at the earliest possible moment. It is absolutely senseless, and worse than useless, either to allow fear to dominate the situation and throw the community into a state of panic or to assume an air of bravado and, disagreeing with the physicians in charge of the patients as well as with the health authorities, affirm that the doctors do not know what they are talking about and what has been diagnosed as smallpox is nothing but chickenpox or an eruption of the skin caused by eating too much pork.

The county physician and one or two other doctors have declared that a very mild form of smallpox is prevalent in Condon at this time. It is also currently reported that a number of persons have suffered from the same disease and recovered from its effect without suspecting the nature of the trouble because of its very mild form, no physician having been summoned.

The writer is not a doctor or the son of a doctor and would not know the difference between smallpox and any other eruptive disease if he were to see them—and he has no desire to "butt in" to a case for the purpose of learning the difference—he is willing to take the doctors' word for it and assume that they know what they are talking about.

This would seem to be a sensible view of the matter for every citizen to take. The Oregon would be glad to learn later that the doctors are mistaken in this thing but until it knows, absolutely, that they are it will urge that their words be given credence and that precaution be taken to prevent further spread of the disease. If they are mistaken, well and good. There will be no great harm done. If they are not mistaken every word spoken against their diagnosis will make proper quarantine of infected homes that much harder to maintain and will encourage the spread of the disease and jeopardize the best interests of the town.

Let every citizen use good, common business sense in this matter and unite in stamping out the eruptive pest, whatever it may be at the earliest possible moment. And if there should be any who refuse to comply with the strictest requirements of the authorities in the matter they should be forced to do what common sense and good judgment should prompt them to do willingly.

Robbery at Blalock.

Last Saturday night, at Blalock, burglars entered the store of ex-County Judge Mariner and blew open the safe with nitro-glycerin. Thirty-five dollars and a shotgun were secured. E. W. Daggett, ex-school superintendent of this county, who lives near the store, heard the explosion and ran to investigate. He was met by a fusillade of bullets and concluded he had business elsewhere. Judge Mariner also approached the store and was shot at but all the bullets' bullets went wild. The robbers then made their escape but were captured Sunday in a cabin at Biggs by J. C. Fitzgerald, a special detective for the O. R. & N. Co. They were taken to The Dalles where one of them confessed. They are supposed to be old hands at the business and when captured had a quantity of nitro-glycerin, caps, fuse etc. in their possession. Sheriff Johnson was telephoned for Monday morning and went down to bring the men here.

Stockmen Must Pay Fare.

Coal in Fossil.

Otis Kiser and George Clark are digging a shaft on Otis Kiser's place in town, prospecting for coal. The shaft is being sunk about one hundred yards east of Otis' well, which has a coal bottom. At a depth of ten feet coal was struck today, and our people are becoming somewhat excited over it, as the indications point to a solid bed of coal under the town beginning at a depth of from ten to twenty feet. A joint stock company is being formed which will keep the men at work. This company has been offered an option on Mr. Bowen's farm adjoining Mr. Kiser's place and will accept it.

At the Dry Hollow mines, 15 miles south of here, which are being developed by Sumpter parties, hundreds of tons of good coal have already been taken out, and it begins to appear that the mine superintendent knew what he was talking about when he said the prospect was far ahead of that near Heppner.—Journal.
