Promoters of a Portland concern known as "The Fraternal Order of Home Buyers," are in trouble and it is up to them to show the federal courts in that city that they have not been using the U. S. mails in an attempt to defraud the public. An expert accountant after investigating the books and business methods of the concern testifies in court that "the fewer members the company has the fewer people will be swindled," and this, alone is sufficient cause for the public to congratulate itself that the investigation was started early in the game. The concern offered for a moderate membership fee and a small monthly payment, to guarantee to its members that each one of them could own their own home within twenty months and many rent payers were induced to put up the required amount and become members. It now develops that the only persons who acquired homes since the association began business are one or two of the officers and some of their relatives. The Globe turned down a good sized advertising order from these people several months ago because it believed they were promising more than they could make good and that in the final windup somebody would come out loser. We do not care to be a party in any scheme by which our readers may be swindled and thus far the investigation seems to bear out the belief that in this case our position was well taken.

Farmers who are enjoying the benefits of rural mail delivery feel the need of better transportation of small sums of money. At present the only plan is through the use of currency or stamps. Small amounts thus sent are always liable to loss. More than this they afford an unusual temptation to theft. The government owes it to the farmer to provide more adequate means. In his report the postmaster general indicates the great need of some better method. The post-check system, it is believed would answer the purpose advantageously. A bill providing for this was introduced during the last session but time for consideration was too short. During the present session probably this matter will again come before Congress. In this event farmers' meetings would do well to investigate the matter and pass resolutions favoring its immediate passage. If such resolutions were placed in the hands of your representatives at Washington they would prove a powerful factor in attracting attention to the fact that the farmers want and need a better service in this respect. If farmers want postal checks or something equally good they can have it by unity in action.

We Americans sympathize with Japan but we sell Russia plenty of canned meat to feed her fighting men. There is no money in sympathy but canned meat pays—the beef trust.

Condon now has five attorneys. Unless the crop of law suits should prove to be an exceptionally heavy one the coming season, some of them may be obliged to practice more economy than law.
