G. A. Hartman, county judge of Umatilla county, has been indicted on a charge of participating in land frauds in taking filings and final proofs in cases in which he knew fraud existed. It is a serious charge and unless he can successfully refute it may be a serious matter for his honor.

Under the new initiative law a vote will be taken at the next state election on the question of local option regarding the liquor traffic. About ten per cent of the voters of the state have petitioned to have the question submitted to the people and it remains to be seen what disposition of the question the other ninety per cent will make. The primary election or direct nomination law will also be submitted to a popular vote at the same time.

The soft, wet snow Monday furnished the finest material for snowballs and the Condon kids did not allow the opportunity to go to waste. They made life a nuisance to those of us who are too old and fat either to give them battle or run away but the boys enjoyed the fun just the same. One short, fat man laid for the boys with a hose which was in active eruption but even ice water in large quantities failed to cool the ardor of the attacking party and the stout party was forced to withdraw from the field in a wild disorder.

The Republican State Central Committee met in Portland last Friday and selected the 14th day of April as the date of the state convention. Each county will be represented by one delegate at large and one delegate for each 150 votes cast at the last election for supreme judge and one delegate for each fraction of 150 larger than 100. The state committee recommended April 2nd as the date for primaries and April 7th as the date for county conventions. Under this apportionment the convention will number 301 delegates of which Gilliam will send four.

Among the most pleasant social events of the season was the surprise tendered Miss Florence Heaven, at the home of her uncle, J. W. Snover, last Friday evening. About 25 guests were present and a decidedly pleasant evening was spent. A feature of the entertainment was a guessing contest, each guest having been instructed to represent some city and handsome prizes were provided for the lady and gentlemen making the largest number of correct guesses on the different representations. Dr. Mary Bowerman and Miss Iva Shelton tied on the ladies' prize and the tie was decided by drawing straws Miss Bowerman winning. Gerald Burns captured the gentlemen's prize. Miss Heaven has been the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Snover for several weeks and made a large number of warm friends while here. She left Saturday morning for her home in Goldendale.

Dr. Mary Bowerman has been appointed city health officer.

A. S. Rice, on Tuesday, delivered to J. K. Fitzwater 20 head of yearlings the price being \$10 per head.

Henry Stanton, who has been very ill for the past three weeks and whose life was despaired of last Saturday, is improving and strong hopes are now entertained for his recovery.

Senator M. A. Hanna, the noted republican leader who managed the McKinley campaign and brought them to such a successful issue, died at the Arlington hotel in Washington, D.C., Monday afternoon at three o'clock of typhoid fever.

The Foresters' hall which was advertised to come off last Friday evening was called off on account of the smallpox scare and the general dullness of the town at this time. The boys will give their hall at some future time when the conditions are more favorable.

No new cases of smallpox have been reported since last week in the city and but one in the country. The homes of the Vandervest family, on the Cooke ranch and the Haves family west of town are still quarantined as is the home of Mrs. Allie Baiding in town. The quarantine has been raised at the Clark home. The new case reported is in the Austin family on Matney Flat.

A heavy snowstorm prevailed here all day last Sunday covering the ground to a depth of about six inches. Old timers recalled the fact that exactly 13 years ago a snow storm began at about the same time in the morning and continued until about three feet of snow had fallen. Twelve years ago on the 16th a snow storm began which lasted for 15 days and covered the ground to a depth of about two feet. Many feared that the storm of Sunday was to be a repetition of these earlier experiences but at dark the weather moderated and a light rain began falling. At this writing however the snow is still with us and those fortunate enough to possess sleighs are making good use of them.

State Health Officer Here.

Dr. Wood Hutchinson, secretary of the State Health Board, was here Saturday and Sunday looking into the smallpox situation and other sanitary conditions of the town. The smallpox situation was not so serious as to require the attention of the state authorities only for the reason that the city authorities had failed to establish or maintain a proper quarantine of the disease and the county authorities believed that they had no jurisdiction within the city limits and in order to straighten out the matter Dr. Hutchinson was sent for.

After visiting all of the patients affected with the disease in company with County Physician Wood, Dr. Hutchinson attended a meeting of the city council Saturday evening at which he addressed the members of that body as to their duties as public officials in matters in which the public health is concerned. He pointed out the requirements of the law and urged on them the necessity of enforcing the quarantine laws to the letter. After the council meeting Dr. Hutchinson also addressed a citizens' meeting in the court house. He stated that there is absolutely no occasion for alarm so far as the smallpox is concerned if the proper precautions are taken and faithfully carried out. The disease, he said, is in a very mild form and if those now ill are properly isolated there is no reason why the disease should not be entirely stamped out in a few weeks.

The doctor also took up the sewer proposition and urged that the city authorities take immediate action in regard to putting in a proper system of sewerage for the city. He stated that he had received numerous complaints from citizens of the town in regard to the disgusting filthy condition of the old waterway which runs through the town and, worse still, he stated that he had heard still more complaints from travelers and others who have had occasion to visit Condon during the summer months all of whom complained of the next to unbearable stench which arises from it. Everyone, he said, spoke highly of the location of the town, of its wonderful growth during the past year and of its splendid business opportunities but all these words of praise were qualified and their effect badly crippled by the added remark, "but Oh, what a stench comes from that open sewer. It is terrible."

Speaking of the difficulty of disposing of the sewage where there is no stream of running water within reach Mr. Hutchinson recommended the use of a septic tank which he said was a recent invention designed for such locations and which have proven a success wherever tried. The cost he said is reasonable and its utility unquestioned.

We understand the members of the city council were favorably impressed with the recommendations and that they are favorable to taking up the sewer question at an early date.

Vaccination Marks.

By request we publish the following section of rules and regulations of the State Board of Health governing the vaccination of school children:

RULE XXIV.

It shall be the duty of all school boards in all the districts of whatever class in the State of Oregon, to prohibit the entrance into any of the public schools of the State, of all children not previously vaccinated, (the evidence of which is shown by the scar), without proper vaccination; and it shall be the duty of the teacher or teachers in any of the public schools of the State of Oregon to satisfy themselves that such order has been properly enforced, the evidence being a scar, or by a certificate of vaccination signed by a reputable physician.
