Phil Mulkey, a resident of this county died in a Portland hospital last Thursday morning of consumption aged about 45 years. He had been ailing for some time and at the time of his death was being cared for by this county. He was a brother of Mrs. Wm. West of Rock Creek.

Special exercises will be held at the public school tomorrow afternoon by the pupils of Miss Herschner and Miss Shelton's rooms. Miss Herschner's pupils will present a "Longfellow" program and Miss Shelton's classes will render a pleasing program in honor of George Washington. Patrons of the school are invited.

The store of Keys & Son, at Mayville, which has been closed for some time on account of business entanglements, has been reopened by W. G. Keys and L. C. Cushing who purchased the stock and fixtures. Mr. Cushing is a brother-in-law of Mr. Keys and is now a resident of Harney. He will close out his interests at that place at once, however, and will locate at Mayville. The new firm proposes to put in a larger stock than has ever before been carried at that place.

King Alcohol came near getting a good man down in Condon last Sunday morning. It was wood alcohol and he was not drinking the stuff either. He was simply using it as a preservative on some wet fire wood which wouldn't burn without being soaked. The bottle of alcohol was in a state of eruption quick as a flash and "went" and it is said the man also showed evidence of being affected by some sort of seismic disturbance. Particulars of the occurrence may be had from Dr. Brown and Dr. Linn might also be induced to furnish corroborative testimony.

R. H. Galbraith, the jolly stockman of Mayville precinct, was in town Monday. He says stock has been doing well in his neighborhood the past winter and are now in fine condition.

No new cases of smallpox have been reported in town since our last issue and but one in the country, one of the Austin family on Matney Flat. The case is said to be very mild. There seems to be no occasion to fear further spread of the disease and the town will no doubt soon resume its normal condition.

A general scrap at a dance at Alvillo Tuesday night of last week resulted in a number of arrests being made in that neighborhood the warrants were issued from Justice Neale's court in this precinct. Ed Palmer was the complaining witness and the men arrested were Dave Jim, Ben and Ed McMullen. The boys all entered pleas of guilty and paid their fines. Ed paid \$10 for disturbing a public meeting while the other three were assessed at \$30 each on that charge and \$10 each on a charge of assault and battery. Deputy District Attorney Collier, of Fossil, was here to prosecute the cases but the action of the defendants in pleading guilty stopped further proceedings and court adjourned.

Gilliam in Luck.

The jail population was diminished by four last Friday morning when J. A. Wilson, a U. S. Deputy Marshal from Portland, took away the four men who have been held on a charge of burglary from Blalock. The store which was burglarized is also used as a post office and when this fact became known to the U. S. authorities they at once proceeded to take charge of the alleged criminals. W. W. Banks a deputy U. S. district attorney, was here to prosecute the case which came up for hearing before U. S. Commissioner Bowerman. The accused men all entered pleas of not guilty but the evidence adduced was sufficiently strong to warrant the commissioner in holding them under \$1,000 bonds to the U. S. grand jury. W. J. Mariner, of Blalock, J. J. Fitzgerald, an O. R. & N. detective who arrested three of the men, city marshal Wood, of The Dalles, who assisted in making the arrests and W. W. Clancy, an O. R. & N. conductor, were present as witnesses. This county is lucky in getting rid of the quartette as the expense of their keep from now until court meets and the cost of their trial would have been considerable.

Gilliam Asked for Special Exhibit.

The following letter has been received by the Globe from Mr. Henry E. Reed, secretary of the Lewis and Clark Fair. The suggestions contained therein are submitted to the people of Gilliam county for consideration:

Portland, Oregon, February 21, 1904. Dear Sir,

An official invitation is hereby extended to Gilliam county to make a special exhibit either in its own behalf or in connection with some other body, municipal or otherwise, at the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition to be held in Portland in 1905. It is the purpose of the Exposition to encourage comprehensive exhibits by counties and by chambers of commerce, boards of trade and other commercial organizations. For exhibits of this character, illustrating the resources, industries and progress of communities, the following regulations have been provided:

First: The preparing and installing of exhibits by counties or organizations will be left to the counties or organizations in whose name or under whose authority the exhibits are made. Counties or organizations may erect separate buildings, or may install their exhibits in the state building of the state in which the county or organization is located. Space will be provided on the Exposition grounds for all buildings erected by counties and organizations and no charge will be made therefor. Plans and specifications for such buildings shall be submitted to the Director-General for his approval.

Second: All collective exhibits made by counties and trade organizations will be permitted to participate in the general competition; that is be both collective and competitive.

I desire to enlist your co-operation and support in this movement, and respectfully to urge early consideration of this invitation so that, if favorable action be taken, we may have the necessary space and give you ample time to proceed with preparations for your exhibit. Whatever may be the decision upon our invitation, I am satisfied we can shape our plans so as to harmonize all efforts to the end that your exhibit may be highly creditable, not only to your progressive community and state, but to the Exposition as well.

We feel confident that the arrangement we propose will offer to counties an exceptional opportunity of demonstrating their potentialities at the Lewis and Clark Exposition of 1905, and that the result of exhibits made in this way will be beneficial to all.

Railroad Outlook.

Two officials of the O. R. & N. Co., the chief engineer and the traffic manager, arrived at Arlington last Friday in a special car and, taking a team there, drove out over the line of the proposed Arlington-Condon railroad. They engaged the team for Condon but are not known to have been there although the Globe has been informed that they were seen on the ridge a few miles north of town apparently looking over the survey of the proposed road. This would indicate that the much needed line of road is still receiving the attention of the O. R. & N. Co. and may be taken as an encouraging omen that that company or some one acting for them mean to build the road. It is not probable that high officials of that company would make this trip for pleasure or for their health under the present conditions of roads and weather and it may be safely taken for granted that their business was of considerable importance.

Hon. C. A. Duggan, while in Portland not long since, was informed by W. W. Cotton, chief attorney for the O. R. & N. Co., that the road will surely be built and that active work will commence about May 1st. It certainly looks as though things will be doing in grand old Gilliam next Summer.

War News.

War news of a positively reliable nature is hard to obtain but all reports agree that the little brown men are too much for the big Russians. Latest reports say that in a land engagement on the Yalu river, the Japs gained a decided victory killing 2500 Russians. Further reports state that the Japanese again, on Sunday night, under cover of darkness entered the harbor at Port Arthur and destroyed four torpedo boat destroyers thus seriously impairing Russia's fleet.

Democratic County Central Committee Meets.

The Democratic County Central Committee met in Judge Dunn's office February 20, at 2:00 p. m. J. A. McMorris was elected permanent chairman and M. E. Weatherford clerk of the meeting.

On motion of G. S. Smith it was carried that the base from which delegates to the county convention be chosen should be one delegate at large and one delegate for every fifteen votes and fraction over half cast for Supreme Judge at the last regular election.

Motion carried that chairman appoint a committee of three, himself chairman, to set a day for primaries and convention. Judge Dunn and G. Schilling were appointed on the committee.

There being no other business to come before the meeting a motion to adjourn was carried.

Democratic State Central Committee.

At the meeting of the Democratic State central committee held in Portland last Monday, Tuesday, April 19, was selected as the date of the state convention, Chairman Sam White, of Baker City, presided at the meeting. The apportionment of delegates to the state convention was made on the basis of one delegate for each 175 votes cast for Governor Chamberlain at the last election and one delegate at large from each county. The representation from each county will therefore be as follows:

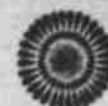
