The Portland Journal refers to the "Gilliam county coal fields." We hasten to correct our city contemporary. The coal fields belong in Wheeler county which joins us on the south and as Gilliam so far eclipses her neighbor in everything else we make the point that Wheeler is entitled to all the glory there may be in the coal deposit which, except some rocky grazing land, is about all she has. Gilliam hopes to buy coal from Wheeler in the near future with which to keep her rapidly developing industries going. Why, bless you, with cheap coal we will soon be raising wheat by steam in grand old Gilliam.

It might be well for the state Board of Portage Commissioners to remember that the legislature made an appropriation for the purpose of building a portage road around the Celilo rapids. It is now more than a year since that appropriation was made and yet nothing has been done. The people of Eastern Oregon understand about the canal right of way matter but they are beginning to think that enough time has been spent on that proposition and that it is now high time for the commissioners to take hold of the portage road and push it through. The people of the Inland Empire want the road because they believe it will help them in the matter of regulating the present excessive freight rates and they also believe it to be the duty of the commission to carry out the provisions of the act by which it was created. Get to work gentlemen; there has been enough dilly dallying in this matter.

The Spring rush of eastern home-seekers has already set in and the Portland papers report the number of arrivals of that class fully up to the expectations. A much larger number is expected a little later in the season and Oregon is sure to have its population increased by several thousand before the Summer is far advanced. Gilliam county has room to supply many of these people with desirable homes if there was only some way provided to let them know about our resources and the opportunities we have to offer them. All that is necessary to draw our share of these newcomers is a little united effort on the part of the residents of the county but in the past this has been a hard matter to get under way. If some literature descriptive of the county could be prepared and circulated it would no doubt have a good effect and it would not cost much either. If there is anyone in the county who is interested in attracting home-seekers or land buyers they should take hold of this matter and do something.

The Pendleton grocer's association gives out the information that about 99 per cent of their customers who cannot pay their grocery bills are workmen who are habitual gamblers. Their weekly pay checks go to support the gentlemen of the green cloth rather than to pay their grocery bills and keep their families. It is not stated whether or not the grocers were behind the movement which resulted in closing the gambling houses in that town but perhaps such was the case. Many people have not thought much about this proposition but there may be something in it after all.
