Mrs. Carrie May McKinney, wife of Reuben McKinney, of this city, died yesterday morning, of typhoid fever, aged about 30 years. She was seriously ill for some time and the end was not unexpected.

Deceased was a daughter of Jonathan Boyer, of Mayville precinct. She was born in the state of Missouri, March 23, 1874, and when yet a child came with her parents to Oregon and has since been a resident of this county. Here she grew to womanhood and here she had formed many friendships which death alone could end. She was a devoted wife and mother and those who knew her best loved her for her many admirable qualities. She was a member Minnehaha Rebekah lodge of this place and at the time of her death was occupying the Noble Grand's chair in that lodge.

Her husband and three young children, her father and several brothers and sisters are left to mourn her loss.

A home is desolate. A husband and children are left without the care and counsel of a noble wife and mother and their friends and neighbors mourn with them.

The funeral will take place today at 2 p. m. from the Baptist church under the direction of the Rebekah lodge, the church services being conducted by Rev. F. C. Flowers.

Hardie vs. Parrish.

The attention of the county court was taken up Monday and Tuesday with the trial of a civil action brought by George Hardie, of Trail Fork, to recover a sum of money amounting to about \$140 from George Parrish, of the same neighborhood, alleged to have been loaned the defendant several years ago. Hardie testified that he loaned Parrish \$50 for one time to pay a debt contracted in a friendly game of draw poker with some of his neighbors, and that he also stood good for the payment of another \$50 to Jack Steers of whom Parrish had purchased some horses and that he had that to pay. He also claimed \$40 more as payment for lumber and other material furnished by him to Parrish to build the cabin on the latter's homestead.

Parrish then went on the stand and testified that he did not owe Hardie the amount claimed or any other amount. He admitted the payment by Hardie of \$50 to Jack Steers for him and also admitted having received \$50 more from Mr. Hardie in consideration of which he was to deed his homestead to Hardie when he "proved up." He reconsidered this agreement, however, and after receiving a title to the land from the government he sold the place to another party.

In his answer to the complaint Parrish filed a counter claim for \$150 alleged to be due from Hardie for the use of the homestead during the five years he held it and this amount he claimed should offset the amount claimed by Hardie.

The taking of testimony occupied all of Monday and Tuesday forenoon and it was late in the afternoon when the case was finally submitted to the jury. After a short consultation in the jury room a verdict was returned for the defendant in the sum of \$25 the costs being placed on the plaintiff.
