Arlington and Pacific Will Build.
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the A. & P. R. Co. was held in Portland Monday evening. Reports from officers of the company showed excellent progress in the work and the announcement was made that the survey will be finished and grading begun at an early date. The following officers were elected: J. E. Simmons, president; John Montag, vice president; J. P. Finley, treasurer; Max M. Shillcock, secretary.

Smallpox in Oregon.

Bulletin No. 1, issued by the Oregon State Board of Health is out and a copy has been received at this office. The pamphlet is entitled "The Story of Smallpox in Oregon and Its Testimony to the Value of Vaccination." A complete history of the disease which has prevailed in many sections of the United States during the past five or six years and which has been variously known as "Manilla Itch," "Cuban Itch" etc., is given in the argument going to show that they have all been a wild form of smallpox. Special attention is given to the epidemic at Shanika and Prineville a year ago and some interesting statistics are given showing the beneficial results of vaccination. There were 29 cases with 9 deaths, a mortality of over 30 per cent. Of these 29 cases 12 were not vaccinated of which 9 died a mortality of 75 per cent. Of the 16 vaccinated cases not one died.

The writer pays his respects to the well known traveling man who "in a loud mouthed and insolent manner defied the authorities and the disease, boasting that in addition to his original exposure he slipped under the ropes and slept in the hotel while it was being fumigated" and that "when stricken with the disease he promptly turned and fled for his home where he exposed his family."

The bulletin makes interesting reading to all who are interested in understanding this loathsome disease.

That Spelling Match.

Editor Globe:

I want to make a last appeal through your paper for that proposed spelling match.

Since writing my last letter I have talked with several about it and have found no one opposed to the idea. All seem to be of the opinion that a good, old fashioned spelling match would be productive of much good. One person even promised to donate five dollars to help defray expenses. Now as every one seems interested and some eager for a spelling contest why are we holding back so long. Can't we get down to business and arrange for a "return of the good old times" about the last of March or the first of April? I have a plan I am going to submit which I think will work all right and if anyone interested has a better one I hope he or she will feel free to submit it at once.

Of course we want a good program to be rendered in connection with the spelling. First, a public meeting should be called by some one competent to lead in such matters and at such meeting at least two committees appointed to take charge of the work. A committee on program and entertainment to have charge of the social part of the proceedings and a committee on arrangements to designate the part or parts of the text book from which words will be given, choose some one to pronounce and make all rules necessary to carry out the work successfully. A small admission fee could be charged say ten cents which I believe would provide amply for all expenses. I think it best to give a prize to the winner and also giving a second prize has its advantages, as a keener interest will be taken and the contest more spirited than when spelling merely for honors.

I am honest in my convictions that we might have other contests more detrimental to the public good than a spelling school and all as friends of the public schools agree with me generally I feel at liberty to say what I have said. Come ye friends of the spelling proposition fall in line, be on the alert, be active, be in earnest and let's advertise Gilliam county as she never was advertised before.

Oregon Is Good Enough.

P. M. Hanratty returned Friday from Alberta and other North-west Territories where he spent several weeks looking for a location and sizing up the country. He is pleased to be back and says Oregon is good enough for him and a considerably milder climate than that of the north land. At Edmonton there was four feet of snow when he left and at Calgary 200 miles farther south the snow was 18 inches. At Edmonton the thermometers registered between 28 and 45 below during his stay and at one time reached 36 below zero. In the Edmonton country the land is swampy and is covered with a dense growth of brush, and practically all of it has to be cleared before it can be farmed. The crops were a complete failure last year on account of heavy summer frosts. Old settlers in the country stated, that Mr. Hanratty that some years they have raised heavy crops but that every year the grain is more or less damaged by frost. He brought a sample of wheat back with him which was grown in southern Alberta next to the Montana line, which is of excellent quality, testing 64 pounds to the bushel, but even in that locality many of the kernels are damaged and shriveled by the frost. The wheat is of the Turkey Red variety.

Near Edmonton the railroad company holds its land at from \$7 to \$10 per acre but, Mr. Hanratty stated, he was offered deeded land in the same locality and of the same quality at \$2.50 per acre.

Fleas and mosquitoes are a great pest to stock as well as to the people in the Edmonton country during the summer months. Altogether Mr. Hanratty's report is not very flattering to that country.
