A very readable and interesting article from the pen of Mrs. Ida Crouch-Hazlett, appears in the March number of Wilshire's magazine under the title, "Meaning of the Colorado Strike." Being a resident of Colorado as well as a close student of the capital and labor question the writer is exceptionally well qualified to handle this question with more than average intelligence. Her deductions are not complimentary to many people who rank pretty high in Colorado but perhaps this is more the fault of the people than of the writer. The cause of the strike is said to have been the failure of the legislature to pass a law, to which they were pledged before election, rendering operative an amendment to the constitution to make valid the eight-hour law which had twice been voted by the people of the state. The mine owners, the Citizens' Alliance and even the government of the state come in for their share of censure. Mrs. Hazlett will be remembered by many of our readers as the gifted woman who toured Oregon four years ago in the interests of the Equal Suffrage amendment. She spoke two evenings in Condon and earned the reputation of being the most brilliant campaign speaker who ever addressed a Condon audience. Her work no doubt accounted for the good majority which the amendment received in this county.
