Serious Stabbing Affray.

A serious stabbing affray occurred at a dance at the home of George Jones at Lost Valley, last Tuesday night and as a result Ben Enaley has since been hovering between life and death, suffering from a bad knife wound in the right side. Details of the affair are hard to obtain at this time but from reports brought in Sunday by Messrs. Cox and Anderson who live in that neighborhood it seems that the fight was a general one and that Al Smith was the knife wielder. The report of the affair given by Mr. Cox was substantially as follows:

Bad feeling had existed between Enaley and the Mungers for some time and the Mungers and Al Smith went to the dance at Jones' with the expressed intention of "doing Enaley up." The three Mungers attacked Enaley outside the door and were all promptly knocked down by Enaley who is described as a young physical giant and rather handy with his fists. While engaged with the third Munger Enaley was struck on the head with a club by the first one who went down and was knocked backward into the doorway. While yet down he was struck with a dirk by Smith who then ran for the timber. Smith was located the next day and was arrested and taken to Fossil where he is in jail. The Mungers boys were also arrested and taken to Fossil where one entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$15 while the other pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for yesterday.

Sentiment in the Lost Valley country is said to be with Enaley in the matter and feeling is strong against Smith.

Ball Players Get Busy.

Condon will have a baseball nine this coming summer that will be a credit to the town. Indications now are that even the splendid record made by the Condon boys last season will be totally eclipsed during 1904. A meeting was held last Friday afternoon at which most of the prospective players were present and the preliminary steps were taken for launching a winning combination for the coming summer.

The players selected Friday were as follows: Pearl Jarvis, L. Siebal, Joe Block, Gerald Burns, J. Q. Jarvis, H. A. Scoggin, John Anderson, Fred Edwards, Gus Morris, D. R. Parker. Mr. Siebal was selected as manager and Pearl Jarvis as captain of the team. Most of the players are well known here and are old time favorites with Condon devotees of the game and the newly acquired players all come highly recommended. Mr. Siebal formerly played with the Salt Lake team and was a popular umpire in the intermountain country a few years ago where he has acted in that capacity for many good games. Mr. Parker has played for several seasons with good teams in the Willamette valley and is said to be a "cracker jack" catcher. He will probably play in that place the coming season. Pearl Jarvis has been selected as pitcher and with him in the box the Condon fans may safely count on some pretty work and some hot playing. Positions for the other players have not been definitely settled yet but with the material at hand it may be safely taken for granted that every place in the lineup will be ably filled.

People of the town generally are taking a lively interest in the matter and the glowing expects to see Condon's team over itself with glory before the close of the season. Saw Mill Sold.

Herbert Halstead, of the Lost Valley Lumber Co., has sold his mill, land and other property on Buckhorn to F. M. Pitter, of this city, and Jack Carr, of Fossil. The deal was made Saturday and the papers will be signed and the final transfer made in a day or two. Mr. Halstead has built up a fine business there and it was only on account of his wife's health and the urgent necessity for seeking a milder climate that induced him to dispose of it. Mr. Halstead will be here most of the summer closing up his business and his family will remain in Portland. In the fall they will go south to seek a home in the region of balmy breezes and perpetual sunshine. Mr. Carr has had long experience in the saw mill business as manager of the Jute Creek mill at Fossil and Mr. Pitter has also had experience in this business. The new owners will no doubt do well in their venture.

Charlie's False Step.

Charlie Earhart, of Leno, who is well known here, had an experience in Portland recently which he will not soon forget. He stepped into an open elevator shaft and fell into the basement. Fortunately he was on the ground floor when he made the false step and fell only ten or twelve feet. Suffering a severe shaking up he was not injured. The most serious feature of the accident was the fact that he struck the bottom of the elevator above him starting down. He threw himself on the floor and waited the instant the car was rushing down and that instant probably seemed an hour long.

"I didn't know in the darkness," said Mr. Earhart, "whether the cage would stop before it flattened me or not, and I think I was about as well spread out over the floor as I would have been if the car had landed on me." The bumpers, however, held the car from touching the prostrate man, though until the elevator moved upward again Earhart could not move a muscle, but remained hugging the grimy floor.

A woman noticed Earhart's plunge and told the elevator boy who sent his cage to the second floor and allowed the prisoner to crawl out.

Democratic Call.

The Democratic County Convention for Gilliam County is hereby called to meet in the court house at Condon, Oregon, on Saturday, April 16, 1904, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for county officers, electing delegates to the state and congressional conventions and transacting such other business as may properly come before the convention.

Delegates to this convention have been appointed as follows: Arlington 4, Lone Rock 2, Ilaboca 5, Matney 2, Condon 6, Mayville 3, Ferry Canyon 7, Rock Creek 4, Idea 1, Trail Fork 2, Willow Creek 2.

Being one delegate at large for each precinct and one for every 15 votes or major portion thereof cast for Supreme Judge at the last state election.

The primaries for the purpose of electing delegates to the county convention and for nominating precinct and district officers will be held at the usual voting places in the various precincts on Wednesday, April 13, 1904.
