The republican convention met in the court house last Saturday. Most of the delegates were in town by Friday evening but no caucus was held. At ten o'clock the convention met and organized. A recess was taken for half an hour when the convention assembled and elected delegates to the state convention. The fight between the Moody and Williamson factions did not cause much excitement as the Moody delegation was largely in the majority and the delegates to the state and district convention are favorable to the ex-Congressman. W. H. Colwell, W. N. Brown, C. A. Danneberg were chosen. At one o'clock p. m. the meeting was called to order with J. G. Stevenson in the chair and S. A. Thomas as secretary.
