The democratic county convention was held in the court house Saturday. The convention met at 10:00 a. m. and organized. An adjournment was taken until 2:30 p. m. when, with E. P. Weir in the chair and H. F. Shanks as secretary, the nomination of county officers was proceeded with. Following is the result, each nomination being made by acclamation: Clerk—George Clough. Sheriff—T. G. Johnson. Assessor—A. J. Shelton. Commissioner—James Larch. School Superintendent—H. F. Shanks. Treasurer—John H. Downing. Surveyor—John A. McMorris. Coroner—D. C. Lagier.

The only ballot taken in the convention was on state delegates with the following result, the three first named being chosen: Andrew Greiner—24. Edward Donn—22. Henry Wilkins—17. E. P. Weir—12. William Randolph Hearst was endorsed by the convention as candidate for president.

State Dairy and Food Commissioner—Charles Hohman. J. N. Williamson was renominated for Congress in the Second District as was Binger Hermann in the First. In the Seventh Judicial District John A. Collier was nominated for district judge and Frank Menefee for district attorney.

In the Twenty-First Senatorial District, comprising Gilliam, Sherman, and Wheeler counties, Jay Bowserman was nominated for joint senator and N. R. Donnelly and C. C. Koeney for representatives.

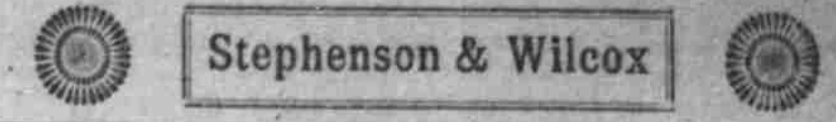
